preparation for communion during church on a recent Sunday, we were reminded to prayerfully consider the past, present and future. I think that sometimes we all forget how important all three parts are to our lives! Our present is rooted in the past, as much as we are now sowing the seeds of the future I was recently saddened to hear again, as I did almost twenty years ago, that some in our faith community feel that our situation at Archwood is dire. Please allow me to share my perspective, as well as some history, with you.

Archwood has weathered many storms in the past nearly-200 years:. Financial struggles, building and repairs, conflicts within the membership. Not to mention issues of loss of lives in multiple wars, the Great Depression, and, I'm certain, deaths due to diseases which are now largely eradicated, along with many other difficulties. God has always provided, not necessarily what we wanted. but WHAT WE NEEDED.

Twenty-some years ago we struggled with a much smaller active congregation than our current one. Archwood was on extremely shaky financial ground, and pondering how long we could survive financed by our endowment funds. Members were discussing closing, and just giving what was left of the endowment to the Western Reserve Association. But God was not finished with us! At that time we, a nearly-exclusively white, largely elderly, often conservative, middle-class congregation was being called to a new ministry. As unlikely as it would seem, all signs were that God was pointing us in the direction of hiring a gay pastor! We were being pushed in an uncomfortable direction, one that was upsetting to many of our members, but God provided the opportunity for us and gave us the means to do this work. Those of you that are newer to Archwood may not be aware of how we wrestled with spiritual issues during that time.

At present, God has again provided WHAT WE NEED. Never before in Archwood's history have we been so blessed with skilled pastoral leadership within our congregation. When we were without an interim minister, God left

us with the means to solve the problem. That is an incredible blessing! We don't always, and often don't usually, know what the future holds, but we are provided for in the present. God never promised our lives would always be what we think we want, but that we would be provided for. In God's grace and time.

With the hiring of our new interim minister, we go back to the business of discerning Archwood's plan - Archwood's plan in GOD'S eyes. Let us take the lessons that we have learned over the past months, and prayerfully try to discern what God's plan is for us, remembering that we will be provided with what we NEED.

Joyfully calling an Interim Pastor!

By unanimous approval, the Governing Body, with hearty recommendation of the Interim Pastoral Search Committee, extended a Call to the Reverend Stephen Adams. Reverend Adams will be joining Archwood as our interim pastor on November 1st, after completing his current position at Plymouth UCC in Shaker Hts, Ohio. His position with us will be at 20 hours/week. He will be conducting his first worship service on Sunday, November 2nd.

Ordained in the Presbyterian Church in 1989, he has since served communities in the Western Reserve-most recently as an Associate Minister at Plymouth Church, which has also been in an interim period -and as a Parish Associate at the Old Stone Church. In his pastoral roles, Rev. Ad-

ams has addressed O and A initiatives, Bible study and educational opportunities for adults, and service-outreach programs for youth. He served as a Chaplain for the Cleveland Clinic Foundation, and remains involved in counseling at the Ireland Cancer Center and at The Gathering Place; in particular End-Of-Life issues that include support and education for the wider community-family and friends as well as medical staff for these organizations.

His self-discernment of his many gifts would have him focus on Worship and Pastoral Care, within the broader meaning of pastoral care as support of, and interaction with, a congregation to promote healing and wholeness-congregationally and individually. As a musician and trained vocalist he has also assisted in music worship in his pastoral assignments, and sings with Park Synagogue as well as the North Coast Men's Chorus and the Coastliners.

Rev. Adams is familiar with the Archwood Community, and has visited and led worship here when Rev. David Bahr was serving. He is also familiar with varied worship traditions, Christian and non-Christian, and "lives" in diversity as an openly gay pastor with a partner who is Jewish.

He speaks well and movingly of Archwood as an "awesome" congregation and is excited to walk with us in this interim period. Please join in celebrating his Call to us, and make him welcome as he begins his Pastoral work.

Why Do We Have to Have An Interim Minister?

I've heard that question from a number of folks lately. In my work in the national setting of the UCC, I have learned a great deal about interim ministry, and I have seen the amazing growth that can happen within congregations when they take the time to slow down, evaluate themselves and their ministry, and invite God to walk that journey with them. It is out of this experience, that I believe calling another interim pastor will be the opportunity for us to move forward in a way that helps us authentically look at who we are and what we need in our next settled pastor.

Interim ministry is the ministry provided to a local church during a pastoral vacancy. While approaches to interim ministry vary somewhat in the United Church of Christ based on a number of factors, there are some expectations during the interim period that are considered to be "norms" – practices and beliefs shared throughout the church. Among them is the expectation that interim ministry is time-limited, affording the congregation the time and space to examine its history and traditions, mission, and its own unique ministries. By examining its ministry, governance, relationships, and programs, a congregation can address issues that need to be addressed before beginning a new relationship with a settled pastor.

What I hope we will remember during this interim time is that the process of calling a pastor to be in ministry with us is very different from hiring a person to minister to us. While it may seem on the surface that it would be easier and more efficient to simply hire someone to serve as our pastor, I would invite us to consider that the process of calling a pastor is one that asks the search committee and the congregation to prayerfully consider who God might be sending to us. This is a process that often takes more time than simply running an ad and interviewing candidates. This is a process that asks us to invite God into the process – to invite God to lead us during the process, to guide our steps, and to help us listen for the voice that will whisper to us (or shout to us!) when the right candidate emerges.



By allowing the congregation to take a breath and look at its ministry and ask itself whether or not we're all still heading in the right direction, the interim time and the interim pastor can help us invite God into this holy time in a deep and significant way. In the interim time, with the help of an interim pastor, we will have opportunities to think about, talk about, and evaluate all that we have been and all that we want to be in the future. The interim time can help us highlight our unique and special gifts and give us an opportunity to refocus them if needed. The interim time will help us "know" the kind of pastor we want to invite into a long-term relationship with us as our settled pastor.

When we engage in the interim process in a meaningful way, with openness to each other and to God's leading, we will be rewarded with healthier relationships and a deeper understanding about who we are as Archwood United

Church of Christ. We will have a clearer understanding of what we are called to be about as the Body of Christ in this particular place, at this particular time. God is still speaking, and I believe that Archwood is still listening. If Archwood is still listening to the still speaking God, then we can use this next phase of our interim time learning about each other and our mission and ministry. This prayerful time can then inform our search for our next permanent pastor.

Why do we need another interim pastor? I believe we need another interim pastor to lead us in the spiritual and prayerful disciplines that will enable us to move forward in our search and reinforce our understanding of ourselves as a community of believers that is multi-cultural, multi-racial, open and affirming, and a place that welcomes all.

Building Committee Needs

Small and large projects that involve repair and cleaning have been identified:

- ⇒ Repointing and re-caulking of the building, specifically entrances to the west and east entryways, and the wall along the walk to the playground.
- \Rightarrow Repair/patch of a wall-hole on the east side stair-well.
- \Rightarrow Tree debris that needs cleaning away-east side of the church
- ⇒ The roof over the Headstart area needs re-sealed. It is a flat stretch and is relatively easily accessed but may be a bit too high for some people.

Serenity House needs-

- \Rightarrow Check/repair windows for the coming cold months.
- \Rightarrow Repair ceiling leak-first floor dining room-by stair.
- \Rightarrow Carpet clearing
- \Rightarrow Power-wash the building
