

New PA System for FCC

First Christian Church has purchased a first class portable public address (PA) system for use in the Friendship Hall and for functions outside the church. The Samson 200 watt XPL300 speaker system was purchased by the Board using Abiding Memorial funds.

The new PA system has a rechargeable battery that is capable of operating the system for up to six hours. The speaker and battery are heavy but the system has built in wheels and a handle for pulling. A Shure Performance Gear PG58 handheld wireless microphone was purchased to be used with the speaker system. The system includes a sturdy tripod for the speaker so it can project sound over an audience. The system is capable of playing music through inputs for CD player and iPod connections at the same time the microphones are in use.

The XPL300 has already been put to good use for some recent public and church activities in the Friendship Hall.

Now we need volunteers to receive instruction on how to operate the XPL300 so there will be enough people able to use the system when needed. It is very simple to operate. It will only take a matter of minutes to instruct anyone to use the PA. Please at your convenience any Sunday morning, ask Al Parr to you give instructions.

It is a diverse group of highly energetic teenagers who come from a variety of situations – most of them are new to our church.

• There is new life blossoming as we welcome those in our neighborhood facing economic hardship and struggle for healthy, productive lives. Our Helping Hands Fund has been a focus and a resource for ministry and a renewed sense of purpose is emerging as a result.

CWU Hunger Sale April 17-18

It's coming! Church Women United's World Hunger Sale is a much-anticipated annual event, a time when women and men from churches all over Carbondale come together to raise funds to help the hungry. This year the giant yard sale and auction is scheduled for Friday and Saturday, April 17 and 18 at the Newman Catholic Student Center, 715 S. Washington, Carbondale. The sale will be held from 12 noon - 6 pm Friday and 8 am - 1 pm Saturday.

In addition to the yard sale, on Saturday at 10 am. there will be an auction of antiques, collectibles and much more, including some popular limestone planters. Gorgeous hanging and bedding plants from McNitt's Greenhouses are another Saturday feature. Sandwiches and baked goods will be sold both days.

The Sale has been held for over thirty years, earning over \$100,000

since 2000. Proceeds are shared with nine local and six worldwide agencies that feed hungry people. The need is greater than ever among our neighbors near and far, so please consider how you can help.

Shawnee Energy Fest

The Shawnee Energy Fest will be held on May 2nd and May 3rd (Saturday and Sunday) at Green Retreat on Chautauqua Rd. east of Route 127.

The theme of this event is "Ease your conscience locally" and it will showcase local resources (businesses, organizations, networks) that can be utilized to decrease dependence on nonrenewable energy sources. There will be more than 40 workshops, with topics including energy efficiency and renewable energy for the home, organic farming and bio-intensive home gardening, forest issues, conservation, recycling and much more. Some of the features are speakers, tours of Green Retreat, music, food, a children's tent. The cost of the event is \$7 per day or \$10 for the entire weekend. - Blood tests can screen for impaired glucose tolerance which indicates a higher risk for developing Type 2 diabetes


