#### **Pentecost Special Offering May 11**


Next year, in 2009, we'll all celebrate the 200th Anniversary of the Cane Ridge meeting. That huge evangelical gathering, on what was then the American frontier, is regarded by many as the place where the very roots of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) were planted.

Through the years, the Disciples have been leaders in building educational institutions that push the frontiers of knowledge, and in building programs that push the frontiers of caring. ## **Disciples Perspective**

## Good Shepherd 50th

In 1989 the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and the United Church of Christ proclaimed mutual recognition of their sacraments and ordained ministry. This partnership is a unique experiment in U.S. ecumenism. There are now more than 30 "federated" congregations affiliated with both denominations. Ministers ordained by the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) are now serving in United Church of Christ congregations, and UCC pastors are serving in Disciple churches. The Common Global Ministries Board, formed by the UCC's Wider Church Ministries and the Disciples' Division of Overseas Ministries, unites the international mission work of the two churches. The General Assembly held in 2002 at Kansas City was a joint effort between the two denominations, further demonstrating our common ministry and shared vision.

The Church of the Good Shepherd (United Church of Christ) has invited us to participate as their "closest ecumenical partners" in the celebration of their 50 years of ministry in Carbondale. Margie Parker, Chair of the 50th Anniversary Committee, has left flyers describing the many opportunities for participating with our ecumenical partners in celebrating their anniversary in 2008.

## \$11,271 To Feed the Hungry

Thanks to a tremendous effort by over 225 people, the thirty-fourth annual Church Women United World Hunger Sale raised \$11,271 to feed hungry people. In addition to the workers, the sale involved at least eight pick-up trucks and vans hauling in 45 tables (besides the 40 at the Newman Center), 27 clothes racks, 4 heavy shoe racks and lots of donated furniture. Three days later eight more trucks hauled all the leftovers to CWU's Thrift Shop on N. Illinois and returned all the borrowed tables and racks to the churches and homes they came from.

In between, the Newman Center was a gracious and welcoming host to the Sale. The many volunteers cheerfully coped with whatever needed to be done, transforming the Center from a place of worship to a bustling marketplace and then back again.

## **Health Ministry**



May is National Melanoma/Skin Cancer Detection and Prevention Month. To many of us, skin cancer may not seem to pose a "great risk". However, according to *HEALTH MINISTRY UPDATE, Spring 2008, Vol 9; Issue* 2, published by Southern Illinois Healthcare, it is the most common form of cancer and affects 1 in every 5 Americans and in its most severe form of **melanoma** accounts for 1 death every hour.

Non-Melanoma skin cancers are either *basal cell* (non spreading and easily treated) or *squamous cell* (can spread and often require surgical removal.)

Melanoma arises from the deeper layers of skin and may develop in a mole already on the skin. They are most often very dark in color; may be raised, irregular in shape, crusty, bleed easily and quickly invade surrounding tissue. They may invade internal organs as well. Surgical treatment is always necessary and chemotherapy and/or x-ray may be necessary.

Prevention is always the first choice; with early detection and treatment a close second.

Enjoy summer and all the fun it will bring, but protect yourself and those you care about while doing so.

# Tips to Prevent Skin Cancer

Wear sunscreen - Use water resistant sunscreen at least 15 SPF (higher if you are light skinned or burn easily) at all times when outside in the summer. Sun screen isn't just for the pool or beach; anytime you are exposed to the sun you should protect yourself. Remember the sun is hottest from 10 am to 4 pm—avoid exposure then if possible.

Wear hats - Hats that shield your "nose and ears".

#### AVOID tanning beds.

Self examines -"check your birthday suit on your birthday" a good reminder to look at all your moles or any skin areas that you may not see everyday such as your back. A three way mirror is good for this or ask a "special someone" or your doctor to help you out.

## Offering of Letters Campaign May 18 & 25

Bread for the World's 2008 Offering of Letters is pushing for more and better poverty-focused development assistance—funding for programs in the U.S. budget that give people in poor countries the skills and opportunities to break the cycle of poverty permanently. These include long-term investments in things like education, agriculture, nutrition, health and clean water.

We must improve the way U.S. assistance is packaged and delivered so that it reaches those in greatest need with the maximum impact.

More and better poverty-focused development assistance is a critical component of the effort to meet the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). The MDGs are a set of eight achievable objectives adopted by the nations of the world in 2000 to improve the quality of life of hundreds of millions of poor people around the world. All nations promised to fulfill these goals by 2015.

But our work is not over. The increases we've won in poverty-focused assistance have made a difference, but we are not yet on track to fulfill our promises.

2015 looms ever closer. There are still too many people who live in extreme poverty, too many people who go to bed hungry every night, too many children not in school, too many children dying from preventable causes. We can do better.

Bread for the World's 2008 Offering of Letters is pushing for more and better poverty-focused development assistance. That means:

1.Congress should increase its funding for poverty-fighting efforts by at least \$5 billion a year, starting this coming year. Funding should be aimed at programs that most directly address the root causes of poverty and hunger. The programs should encourage the participation of citizens from the targeted communities in crafting programs and setting priorities. 2.Congress should improve U.S. assistance to ensure the maximum benefit reaches those in greatest need.

A first step would be to pass the Global Poverty Act (S. 2433), now in Congress.

The Global Poverty Act would:

Make the first Millennium Development Goal (to cut in half the number of people who are hungry and the number of people living on less than \$1 a day) an official part of U.S. policy.

Require a coordinated strategy to achieve this goal through U.S. aid, debt relief, and trade policies. The strategy would emphasize cooperation with other countries, international institutions, faith-based groups, and the private sector. To achieve the Millennium Development Goals we have to step up the pace. 2015 is just around the corner.


