<u>Health Ministry</u>



Going Green is good for our planet. The use of the new "low energy" compact florescent light bulbs uses approximately 75% less energy and lasts 10 times longer that standard incandescent bulbs; saves \$30.00 or more in electricity costs over the bulbs lifetime; produces about 75% less heat which helps with lowering home cooling bills. These new bulbs are now available in many sizes and shapes for indoor and outdoor use. According to www.enrgystar.gov/index "if every American home replaced just one light bulb with an Energy Star qualified bulb, we would save enough energy to light more than 3 million homes for a year, more than \$600 million in annual energy costs and prevent green house gases equivalent to the emission of more than 800,000 cars.

Even "good things", however, have some drawbacks. Sure, the bulbs do cost a little more, but most importantly, Consumer Reports on Health; Vol 20, No 5, May 2008, cautions that these new bulbs contain mercury, while only 1% the amount found in old thermometers, breakage of the bulb can pose a risk.

Take these steps to insure safety if a bulb breaks:

- (1) open a window and leave the room for 15 minutes;
- (2) wear disposable gloves to clean up broken pieces with a damp paper towel or sticky tape if needed;
- (3) DO NOT use a vacuum to clean up the broken bulb because spread the mercury particles into the air;
- (4) put remnants into a double, sealed plastic bag and discard in the trash outdoors.
- (5) Discard burned out bulbs at a recycling center or as a last resort, sealed double plastic bag.

One night while watching a story unfold on Channel 3 news, I heard the tagline, Be the Church. It took a minute for this to register. Be the church? What?

Mission Yard Sale

On August 3rd we will need some help bringing already donated items down to the fellowship hall. From there on we will need help setting up, sorting and pricing. For all you bakers out there, we will again need your delicious baked goods to sell. They can be dropped off at the church starting Thursday August 14th.

Look for sign-up sheets in the narthex on Sundays in July and August. We have many loyal volunteers that help each year, but the more people we have to do this, the easier and more successful the Mission Yard Sale will be. Our Yard Sale is wellknown in the community for both the quantity and quality of items for sale.

Here are some tips for donors

- Please mark content information on the outside of the box or bag. This saves the sorter having to go through the entire package to see what's included. This holds true, of course, for any other packages that may contain only one type of item (e.g., books, shoes, etc.)
- Items that include several pieces should be kept together, either by taping, pinning, or placing all parts in a bag or box and marking it clearly.
- Fragile items should be wrapped carefully

We cannot sell items that are heavily soiled or badly broken. We will try to clean items that are lightly soiled, if it seems to be worth the effort. But it is certainly preferable if donated items are brought to us in a relatively CLEAN condition

Summer Worship

The Young Disciples will be in worship during the summer, except for one Sunday each month when we will have Summer Fun Sundays. Worship will be a shortened, more casual, kid-friendly service, and nursery care will still be available for our pre-schoolers in the Fellowship Hall.

Summer Fun Sundays are for kids of all ages and will fall on the second week of each month: June 8, July 13 and Aug. 10. On June 8, we will be exploring and creating labyrinths and mazes. On July 13, we will have a mini "campout" in the Playlot in celebration of camp commissioning Sunday. On Aug. 10, we'll cool off with some water play.

Labor Day Campout

Mark your calendars! We are planning to campout together as a church and with other regional Disciples churches on Labor Day weekend, Aug. 29-Sept 1, at Camp Walter Scott. Once again, we will partner with First Presbyterian Church to present Marketplace VBS, and our own pastor will be the spiritual leader for the youth at this event! This year's theme is the story of Moses and the Exodus. The story comes alive as children "visit" the places where the events occurred and do related crafts like hieroglyphics, woodworking, leatherwork, needlework, jewelry making, brick making, and gourds. The cost is only \$10. To register, contact the office.

Last year First Christian's presence, both in terms of children and adult volunteers, was quite large. The children who attended had a great time and really did learn a lot. This year again we are seeking Disciple help in the form of volunteers who can lead crafts booths or participate as group leaders. If you feel called to this ministry, please let me know.

Off to Camp

Logos Summer Camp, for children finishing grades 3-12, is July 14-18. Kids have a blast each year at Camp Walter Scott where they get to fellowship with Disciples from around the region. First Christian assumes half of the \$235 price for our children to attend camp so the cost for families is only \$117.50. Need-based full scholarships are also available. We will commission our campers during worship July 13.

Logos Camp is the one traditionally attended by Carbondale Disciples, but it is not the only camp available at Camp Walter Scott. Disciples camps are available throughout the summer and for many age groups. 

Wainwright, Geoffrey, and Karen B. Westerfield Tucker. The Oxford History of Christian Worship. Oxford University Press, 2006. 916p.

A history of Christian worship and Christian practices is in many ways a history of the Christian Church itself, for the Church would certainly dwindle without a strong worship tradition and scheduled worship services. This massive and authoritative history of Christian worship looks at the spread of Christianity throughout the world, from its earliest times to the present, examining changes

that have occurred in the worship tradition based on geographical and social forces as well as changing interpretations of scripture and doctrine. Emphasis is on organized worship, from cathedral to parish, with details of movements, growth of sects, development of liturgy, and evolution of the worship service. Among the many geographic traditions considered are Byzantine and Slavic Orthodoxy, the Lutheran tradition, the Mennonite church, Catholicism in Hispanic America, and Asian and African missions. However, the impact of other forces are treated as well in chapters addressing the

influence of women in worship, the development of Christian music, vestments, and visual representations of Christian icons. To read The Oxford History of Christian Worship from cover to cover would be a monumental undertaking. However, it is an ideal reference tool suitable for easy searching of aspects of Christian worship, and a quick way to find out why we (and they) as Christians do the things we do . An extensive index makes topics easily found, and hundreds of color and black and white photos enhance the text.—Thomas Kilpatrick.
