For \$100 I will come to your house and disconnect your electric meter and you will be off the grid." Health Ministry

Angel Good Ministry

Angels appear in our lives in the most unexpected ways and forms... one of these Angels is in the form of food through the Angel Food Ministry. In 1994, Pastors Joe and Linda Wingo saw a need to help their neighbors in Monroe, Georgia, by providing food at low cost to 34 neighbors who were out of work and out of luck. From this, Angel Food Ministry developed. Now 500,000 people in 35 states are fed by this ministry. Food "boxes" containing \$65-\$75 worth of high quality food are sold at \$30.00 per box. Approximately 60% of the boxes are purchased by senior citizens and single parent families.

Angel Food Ministry purchases in bulk at discounted prices from established food producers such as Tyson, General Mills, Pilgrim Pride and Nestle at better prices so that the savings is passed on to those purchasing the food boxes. NO DO-NATED FOOD IS EVER SOLD...but is transported without charge to food banks or shelters around the country.

The money from the \$30.00 purchase goes to purchase additional food; to maintain the warehouse space for storing and sorting food; for the trucks and transportation needed to get the food to the 35 states and the hundreds of sites within the states. \$1.00 from each \$30.00 box of food sold goes to the "host church or facility"... According to Dee Ann, head of Angel Food Ministry at First United Presbyterian Church in Mt. Vernon, the \$1.00 a box they receive for being the host church goes to purchase additional boxes of food which are given to those in need in the Mt Vernon community or their own church.

In Carbondale, Grand Avenue Christian Church is a host site for Angel Food Ministry. They have a staff of volunteers who donate many hours each month taking food orders, placing these orders with the national office, accepting delivery of the food and sorting it into the orders needed etc. Anyone, regardless of age, income or circumstance is free to purchase food at \$30.00 box. This is not a service intended for the indigent or welfare recipients....it is not a food bank. Several people in FCC Congregation use this service and are pleased with the products they receive. There will be order forms for November in the narthex if you would like to check this out.

Do we have someone in our congregation who would take orders at FCC and take them to Grand Ave and then pick up the boxes and bring them to our church? Let Marge know if you feel you can serve in this way.

Trick-or-Treating for Unicef

This year, 11 of our Young Disciples participated in Trick-or-Treat for Unicef and they raised \$152! They all looked great in their costumes, and they had a fun time at FCC's pre-trick-or-treat Halloween party where they played a trick or treat game, had a mummy-wrapping contest with toilet paper, played pumpkin bowling, and had a Halloween cupcake walk. It was a great time that raised funds for a great cause that helps children around the world with basic necessities such as nutiritous foods and clean water and educational and medical suppiles.

Outreach

I will tell you the honest truth. Evangelism has never been my kind of thing. The very word brings visions of loud, dramatic ministers, yelling at me to repent, or as one of the many who grace our satellite stations likes to shout, "DIE SINNER, DIE!"

I find myself less than responsive to this line of inspiration. Yet, hope seems to be at an all-time low these days. Bleak economic times have forced us as a nation to cut back, re-evaluate our budgets and spending, and for some of us, consider and worry over dwindling retirement savings. What's to be done in the face of this? Politicians are trying, and we hear pretty words, but honestly, do they really know how to bring us out? Add to this the stress of a looming presidential election, which has emotions high and people more divided than ever, and one might wonder if we'll ever stand together again. CEO's are coming out smelling like roses while the rest of us ponder our fate. It just doesn't quite seem fair.

So, let me bring you back to evangelism. This is a time when people are looking for something to cling to, some sense of hope, of something meaningful and positive in their lives. This is a moment for our churches to shine, to reach out. Yet, even some of our churches are losing their way in the political fray, as denominations grapple with how their congregants should vote, if they are really the Christians they say they are. Where is the sense of hope in that? Doesn't that divide us even more? How can we reach out with a message of hope while we are in the midst of such conflict?

I believe the answer is probably more simplistic than any of us would

guess. In fact, First Christian Church is in an ideal position to address this issue. We are a denomination that encourages thinking, yet all the while embracing the diversity that makes each of us who we are. I know there are people in our congregation who are polar opposite of me in terms of what I believe is best for our country. Yet, I am able to put this aside. Why? It's simple, really. Politics has no place. We are all united in the body of Christ, and this is a relationship that supercedes all else. What a wonderful thing to be able to offer to people who don't really know where to turn right now! Now, does this mean that we go out and yell from street corners, evangelizing all we have to offer? It's true that people are looking for hope in this stressful time, something more to look forward to than a slight rise in the stock market or the fact that they might be allowed to work another day.

Yesterday, I wish all of Carbondale could have heard Katherine's message about the hope we can still have during dark times by simply trusting in the Lord and His plan for us. It was a message I surely needed to hear given how discouraged I've felt as of late. So, how do we share this with everyone outside of our church doors? We are a shining example of our unity in diversity.

Many times I have invited people to our church and wished that I had some type of information to give them so that they might remember what our church stands for and what might attract them to attend. With some of your input, and ideas from our leadership, I will be working on something that can be given out to people. Stay tuned. I'll be asking for your opinions soon.
