

UNRULY HORSES DISRUPT BRAWNER FUNERAL

"It was indeed a fearful moment"

Antioch Community, Harris County, GA — May 22, 1897: After the wife of **James H. Brawner**, passed away last Friday morning, James hired a hearse from Columbus, GA. After the 2:00 p.m. funeral today at the Brawner house, the driver pulled the horse-drawn hearse up to the gate to carry the casket to the cemetery at nearby Antioch Baptist Church. In front of a large gathering of mourners on the veranda of the Brawner home, the horses became frightened and darted away, throwing the helpless driver to the ground and knocking him unconscious. In an effort to stop the runaway horses, neighbor Bill Horne was run over and near-fatally injured. According to the *Hamilton Journal*, the witnessing mourners on the Brawner veranda watched "with bated breath ... expecting at any moment to witness a terrible tragedy ... in which it was believed that two more lives were being suddenly ushered into eternity." Ultimately, the situation came under control. The hearse was so badly damaged in the incident that Mr. Brawner had to use a wagon to carry his wife to her grave. <u>Note</u>: The name of the deceased spouse is not known, but James H. Brawner is probably a descendant of James Middleton Brawner and Emma Buchanan, who were pioneers in the Antioch community.

MARY BROCK BRAWNER ELLIOT DIES

In a Will written 14 November 1727 and probated in Prince George's County, MD the following March 5, Mary Brock Brawner Elliot, the surviving spouse of Henry Brawner (d. 1698), left money to son Edward "Broner"; left personalty to grandsons Edward, William, Thomas and John "Broner" (sons of Edward), granddaughters Elizabeth and Abigail "Broner" (daughters of Edward); left 50 acres of "Hunter's Kindness" and personalty to Henry "Broner" (son of William, deceased) and heirs, except if Henry dies without issue, the 50 acres of Hunter's Kindness is to pass to Mary's son John "Broner" and his heirs. Son John "Broner" is named executor and residuary legatee. The Will is witnessed by Jno. Abengton, Robert Wade Sr., Thomas Phillips and Richard Blew.

[etc.]; and which she is to hold and enjoy during her natural life or to the end of her widowhood, and then to be equally divided among my children ...; except that ... one twelfth part [to be given to] my daughter Lucy McCoy which said twelfth part I give to my son James Brawner ... as trustee for my said daughter Lucy and her children to be distributed to them as their needs may require, but in no instance to be ... sold for the debts of Thomas McCoy the husband of my said daughter Lucy.

I will that all my sons hereinafter named, to wit: Henry P., James, Simeon, William M., Asa, Joseph, Pliney, Jeptha F., & Seabourne J., each have one negro which shall be worth seven hundred and twenty dollars ...; also to make them equal with my two daughters each of whom has received one negro many years since.

3rd I will that all my remaining estate ... shall be equally divided between all my said ten sons and my

tween all my said ten sons and my daughter Harritt Johnson, the one twelfth part to be given to my son James as Trustee for the I, Joseph Brawner Senior of the use of my said daughter Lucy McCoy and State and County aforesaid, being her children to be delt (sic) out to her and children as necessity may require ...

4th I hereby nominate and appoint my beloved sons James Brawner, Henry P. First of all, I resign my body to its Brawner and Joseph Brawner my executors

Given under my hand and seal this Item 1st, I will to my beloved wife twenty sixth day of December Eighteen Elizabeth during her natural life or to hundred and thirty nine in presence of the end of her widowhood all of my Benjamin Smith, Shelton Oliver and David real estate ... which lies on the east Kenlen(?). Signed Joseph Brawner with side of the public road leading from his mark. [Thank you to Jack T.

Note: This is Joseph Brawner, Sr., born choice cows and calves; one choice 19 Nov 1768 probably in NC, died 2 January 1840 in Falling Creek, Elbert Co., GA. He married Mary Jones (1775-1827), with whom he had 12 children. He married, second, Elizabeth Snelling on 24 December 1835 in Elbert

TUESDAY EXITS

Two obituaries of unrelated Brawner spouses in Charles Co., Maryland evoke emotion through language of the day:

Mary Jane Miles Brawner, 22-yearold spouse of J. Thaddeus Brawner, died Tuesday, September 16, 1851:

"Her illness proved the efficacy of an unsullied conscience in quieting the last moments of an expiring soul. endured her protracted suffering with a martyr's fortitude. Love and Hope, like twin Angels, wing to wing, hovered o'er her till terrorless Death afforded relief." [Port Tobacco Times, September 24, 1851].

Amanda E.D. Alexander Brawner (born 1813), spouse of James Lawrence Brawner, died Tuesday, September 15, 1874:

"Her illness was quite protracted, but fond hearts, only a few days ago, looked forward confidently to her speedy recovery, of which there was every prospect. But alas, for the uncertainty of life! The struggle she had passed through was too much for her strength, and she sank calmly to that sleep which knows no awakening here ..." [Port Tobacco Times, September 18, 1874]

QUERIES ANSWERED

Bulletin subscriber Norma Young advises that the parents of John Lewis Brawner (born 18 July 1856 near Pawnee, IL; married Chloe Jane Landrey 1 May 1878; died 1 March 1916 near Pawnee, IL) are John Smith Brawner and Ruth Smith. John Smith Brawner is the son of John Brawner (b 1799 in MD and twin to William T. Brawner). As of 1 March 1916, Ruth lived in Kansas. Little else is known about John and Ruth Smith Brawner, who happen to be the great grandparents of Norma Young. Thank you, Norma!

Bulletin subscriber Jack T. Brawner tells us that the father of brothers Jeptha and Samuel Pryor Brawner is Bazil Brawner, who died in the Mexican War near Pueblo, Mexico on January 16, 1848. Bazil Brawner moved from Elbert Co., GA to Kentucky about 1820. Bazil's second wife was Nancy Campbell, who died after 1872, probably in Pulaski Co., KY. His first wife is unknown.

Brawner Book

After much hard-work, Bulletin announces the publication of her book entitled Brawner History Book.

According to Mary, the book has over 700 pages, including over 300 pictures and many obituaries, stories, wills, probate records and military records. "It was about 15 years in the making," says Mary. "I have visited many courthouses, historical libraries, homes, etc. for information; written many letters and sometimes run into some obstacles ..."

The book, which focuses on the Ohio and Iowa Brawners and includes the allied families of Huber, Moon, Stewart, Smith, Morrow and Durian. also reflects genealogical work of Mary's late mother. "My mom was always interested in genealogy and stories about the different families.... My mother collected newspaper articles for about 60 years and many pictures and letters about our relatives that I have added into the book." BRAWNERS BY THE NUMBERS

A brief, unscientific statistical look at the Brawners reveals some interesting subscriber Mary Brawner Viter facts. In the Bulletin's database of over descendants of Henry and Mary Brock Brawner, believed to be the first Brawners in America, there are some striking trends for births, deaths and marriages. December, October, February and June, in that order, are the most popular months for marriages. Surprisingly, May, March and August are the least popular months for exchanging vows.

The greatest number of Brawner deaths occur in March with January, February, September and December near tied for a distant second. May and July, with October a distant third, seem to be the best months for surviving death's call.

Births in our family occur most frequently in August, October and July, respectively. For those who are counting, that makes the most popular months for conception November, January and October, generally some of our colder months. The least birth activity in the Brawner family occurs in **February**, **April** and **May**, saying something perhaps about the temperatures in May, July and August.

LIFESPAN.

The chart to the left depicts the ages at which the descendants of Henry and Mary Brock Brawner have died over the years. Although chart is based unscientifically derived data, it does reflect the historical child mortality rate as well as identifying the age range of 70-79 as the most common life decade for deaths in this family.

"DEATH SUMMONS JOHN L. BRAWNER ...

Died, at 12 o'clock noon, Wednesday, March 1, 1916, at his home [near Pawnee, IL] about one mile northeast of the city, John L. Brawner, aged 59 years, 4 months and 11 days.

Death was preceded by an illness from a complication of diseases that covered a period of about four months, though its final stages were not manifest until a brief few weeks ago. As the fatal termination approached [sic] the patient's sufferings were intense and his decline noticeable from day to day. He bore his burden of pain with great fortitude, facing the inevitable with a heroism that was comforting to those whose hearts were saddened by his passing.

Mr. Brawner was born on a farm near Pawnee October 18, 1856. Practically his entire life was passed in this immediate locality. His marriage to Chloe Jane Landry occurred May 1, 1878. To this union were born ten children. The surviving members of the family are the wife, four sons and six daughters. The sons are Lewis M., of Pawnee; Emory, of Springfield; Daniel M., of Iowa; and Jerry, residing at home. The daughters are Mrs Charles Hildreth, of Staunton; Mrs. George Matthew, Mrs. Joseph Alexander, of Pawnee; Miss Marie, of Springfield; Misses Emma and Anna, at home. He is also survived by his aged mother, residing in Kansas, one sister, three brothers and twelve grandchildren.

Mr. Brawner's life was one of industry, simplicity and devotion to those bound to him by the ties of kinship. He lived closely within his family circle, yet a genial disposition revealed itself upon familiar acquaintance. He was ever prompt in responding to the call of neighbors and those who lived about him were made to know that his kindly offices were always at their command. His passing removes one of the community's most familiar figures and brings sincere sorrow to a host of friends.

REBECCA SMITH FUNERAL SUNDAY

Funeral services for Mrs. Rebecca [Brawner] Smith were held at the Methodist church in Bassett [Nebraska] Sunday afternoon, with Rev. Leland Spurrier, the pastor, officiating. Mrs. Smith was one of the few remaining early pioneer settlers of Rock county, the family having established its residence here almost a half century ago. With her husband and children Mrs. Smith made the trip from Iowa to Rock county overland in 1884 and took up the life of a pioneer in this then sparsely settled section of Nebraska. Through hard work, many sacrifices, and courage the home was built and quite a ranch accumulated and it was there Mrs. Smith remained until the infirmities of age compelled her to move from the ranch and establish her home in Bassett where she resided at the time of her illness. Mrs. Smith was a cheery, familiar figure in Bassett and especially so in the church and church organizations of her choice and she will be greatly missed by her family and many friends. Rebecca Brawner was born in Washington, Iowa, in 1849 and died at her home in Bassett, Nebr., on February 24, 1932, having reached the advanced age of 82 years, 2 months and 18 days. She was the oldest daughter of Alex and Mary Morrison Brawner and one of seven children, all of whom, with the exception of Mrs. Sarah Huber of Washington, Iowa and Mrs. Ida Young of Keota, Iowa, preceded her in death. In 1869 she was united in marriage to Abram Smith, now deceased. To this union was born three sons and two daughters, Mrs. Gertrude Lamb of Des Moines, Iowa; Frederick C. Smith of Manhattan, Montana; Mrs. Jeanette Pullman of Ponylake, Nebraska; Arthur A. Smith of Stockton, California and Ira M. Smith also of Ponylake, Nebraska. Besides her immediate family she leaves eight grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.
