He married Bethiah (OR Bethran Rann) Rand June 15, 1831 in New York City, NY by Rev. Henry Chase, daughter of Amos Rand and Mrs. Rand.

Per Opal Halla, 4/1999 - John Cooper Smith was born in Maine and a Sea Captain. He married Bethiah Rann or Rand (either spelling). He had 10 children: John Amos, Sarah Catharine, Charles Augusta, Carrie May, Alma Jane, Edith Youlen, Lamont Lacy, Jessey Maud, Elsie Elizabeth, Arthur Cooper.

John Amos came to Montana in 1899 from Bottineau, ND with his sons Charles A., Lamont L., and Arthur C. John Amos died Sept. 29, 1900. He married Sarah Catherine Bogenrief July 7, 1855.

Not everyone interprets my warped sense of humor the same and so I'll try to remember to label my 'opinion' as such. Some of them just may give a far-fetched clue such as; In my reading of historical novels one was based on actual names of Revolutionary soldiers and Amos Cooper was one. Couldn't the Smiths by chance have been proud of that and used those names?

Clyde Hall challenged the story of ornery John Cooper curing his wife of cancer but because he was mad at his daughter, he let her die. Clyde said they had no cancer cure in those days. He's so right. However, I had heard that story from both Mom and Aunt Jess and it just added to the characterization of him as an ornery old coot. They told that in his travels to China as a sea captain he picked up lots of knowledge of cures and passed them on to John Amos. Mom told of her Dad holding her between his knees and forcing salt water up her nose as a cure, or at least a treatment for catarrh. That same treatment showed up in the 30s as a cheap form of the then popular nosedrops. It wasn't long before the doctors proclaimed it a no-no because of the damage it did to the tissues. I'm sure Mom would have gladly had a doctor stop her Dad's ministrations because it's a painful treatment. Incidently, was Mom the source of your kids (and yours) allergies? Remember how I learned to head off her colds with your copyronal?

Bethia Rann Smith was John Cooper Smith's wife. I haven't a single anecdote about her, but she is on picture 1. She and John C. Were married June 15, 1831 at New York City by Rev. Henry Chase with witnesses William S. Johnson and Mary C. Francisco.

John was a sea captain whose crew jumped ship at San Francisco during the 1849 gold rush. John "rushed" too. He brought out enough washed gold to buy a farm at Marengo, IL. He died 12/30/1885 and was buried at Monticello, MN. This is a quote from Clyde's Astonisher of March, 1958. Clyde had mentioned before that he was to get a look at an old Bible and he must have because he listed him as John Cooper and before that he had said John Calhoun and I was positive he was mistaken. (John Cooper was a policeman in New York - confirmed by Kathryn who heard it from her mother, Elsie Smith-Swanson.)

John Cooper Smith, as told by Jess Smith Hall:

"I don't really know why, but Dad (John Amos Smith) was getting ready to go on a trip.

(Could it have been when Bethia died?) I remember Mama saying, "Whatever you do John, don't bring Grandpa home with you". When he came home, he had John Cooper in the wagon with him and he said, "What could I do, Sarah? No one else would take him."

He had a room to himself. When his little income would arrive, he would come to the door and say, "Now Jissy, do something for the old man. Take this money and go get the old man some oysters and don't tell anyone. I don't remember if he shared, but I doubt it. I seemed to be his pet though. Once when he got his money he bought me an organ and when I learned to play, thanks to the generosity of Mrs. Day giving me free lessons, he would say, "Come on, Jissy, play a tune for the old man."

Aunt Jess would work real hard to learn a new piece and then to her disgust, Elsie would sit down and play it by ear with no lessons. She envied her sister Elsie's talent, but then Elsie always envied her her music lessons!

John C (as told by Elise Smith Swanson):

He must have left investments in California because every so often he would get some money from there. Once it was delayed and the "old man" was worried. He prayed to the Lord for help and promised that if the money came he would give a part of it to charity. It came and then he said that charity began at home so he bought vegetables to fill the cellar. No doubt he was insuring himself a full stomach, but as there were 11 mouths to feed, he may have had a point, especially as Dad was never a very good provider. He was always fussy and wouldn't let us kids peel the potatoes because we wasted too much. He would sit there peeling the thinnest little peels possible. Of course Jess and I were delighted to get out of doing it.

Aunt Edith Smith Heustis told the same story. I wonder if he had a delicate enough touch to leave the minerals and vitamins? In case you kids don't know it, potatoes were always peeled before boiling until the depression years and at first this was looked at askance, but the drought produced such little ones that it was a necessity and most of us soon found that we liked the skin. And we were learning about minerals and vitamins.

This seems to be a good place to tuck the story of the Youlen ring. There was an Uncle with the surname Youlen and he and wife had no children so when they heard that John Amos and Sarah were having another baby, they sent a gold nugget for the newcomer if they would name it Youlen. The baby was a girl, so she was named Edith Youlen and the nougat was made into a ring. She passed it on to her daughter Elsie Sarah but as Elsie had no children, she gave it to Avis Youlen and the ring is being passed to Youlen Barkus Colling; on to her Leslie Youlen Levingood who has in Adrianne Youlen age 6, 1979. After going through all these notes I have come to the conclusion that the original Youlen must have been a brother-in law of John Cooper or Bethia. Could it have been a '49ner crony of John Cooper?

Aunt Gus (John Amos' sister-in-law) had a story that the Smiths were cheated out of what is known as Trinity propertyone of the blowing Smiths

Per Saga written by Jessie Maud (Smith) Hall:

Early in the 19th century, my paternal grandfather, John Cooper Smith, was born in the city of New York. He went early to sea and became captain of a sailing vessel, trading along the Atlantic coast of South America, rounding the Horn (that terror of the old sailing days) and continuing on up the Pacific coast of the Americas as far as San Francisco. In telling us of this trip, Dad (John Amos Smith) would make a horrible face and draw his finger across his throat, then cry "Sacre", then he explained that was what the Spaniards in the parts where they stopped would like to do to all Americans.

Grandfather's was one of the vessels caught in San Francisco harbor during the gold rush of 1849, deserted by its crew, and left to rot, with hundreds of other derelicts.

He had taken my father, John Amos Smith, a boy of 19, on this trip and they staked a claim in the mines and worked it until they had enough money to buy a farm back in Illinois, near the village of Marengo. (Marengo, IL is in McHenry County - Long/Lat 42:14:55 N - 088:36:30 W) Grandfather retained an interest in the mine and received small remittances from it to the day of his death in 1883. He moved his family of 4 boys (Billie, John, Ron, and Charlie) and 2 girls (Gussie and Lou) to Illinois, where they lived till after the Civil War.

In 9/20/1850 Census Bloomfield Township, Walworth County WI, John C. Smith was listed as (out of state) - he was in CA gold rushing yet., Dwelling No. 833, Family No. 844 (same was David W. Casey).

In 1875 census he was listed as having Neuralgia and that he had 5 living children, all were with him except a 5th who lived in Illinois.

In 1880 census listed as 74 year old male, 125/138, who had neuralgia. He also was listed as being a miner by occupation. They say John, but I think it was Charles W. who was a machine agent.

Per the list of voters in the "History and Business Directory of Wright County" (about Monticello), John C. Smith was a resident of the village of Monticello, MN circa 1867. Other Smiths listed in the brochure were J.J. Smith (farmer 5 miles west), William Smith (resident of village of Monticello, MN), and B.R. Smith.

His obituary (from the Fergus Falls Weekly Journal of 1/7/1886)
In this city, Wednesday afternoon, December 30, at the residence of John Smith, Mr.
J.C. Smith died of old age (78 years). He lived with his son, John, since his wife's death in 1873. Mr. Smith has been a resident of Fergus Falls since 1887, and was a greatly respected and esteemed gentleman. Since his son John moved here, he has made his home with him. He leaves 5 children, all of mature years and married, four of whom were at his bedside at the closing hour. The fifth, who lives in Illinois, was unable to reach here

in time. Mr. Smith has been failing rapidly during the last month, and he knew and realized that death was near, but had no fears on that account. His last hours were calm and peaceful, and he sank to rest like a tired child dropping off to sleep. He was taken by his son - John Amos Smith to Monticello, MN for interment, where he will be laid next to his wife. Funeral services were on 1/1/1886.

From Saga of Sarah C. Bogenrief - written by Jessie Maud (Smith) Hall: During the war, white flour was at a premium, and the family had only dark rye bread. But Grandmother (Bethia Rann) Smith was very ill and the doctor said she must have

only white bread. They managed to get enough to make one loaf at a time and the two aunts very willingly allowed their little Dutch sister-in-law to make the loaf, but were careful to be on hand to take the crust, which grandmother couldn't eat, when the loaf was cut. When this happened two or three times, the little Dutch girl decided it was her turn so while the loaf was still warm and the unsuspecting aunts were not around, she cut off the crust and carrying it out to the swing, proceeded to enjoy it. Let's not ask how the aunts felt.

In 9/20/1850 Census Town of Geneva, Bloomfield Township, Walworth County, WI - Bethiah Smith listed as 40 year old female on page 34, Dwelling No. 833, Family No. 844 (same was David W. Casey).

Bethiah Rand & John C. Smith - sea captain took 3 years. Came home had 3 year old child.

In 6/12/1860 census she was married to John C. Smith and lived in Monticello, Wright County, MN. Members of her household were: John A. 28 son, Sarah C. 22, Charles A. 1 (son of Sarah), Louis A 23, William Y, 21, Charles W. 19, Augusta B. 16, daughter married name King, and an Isadora Casey 11 years old.

She (Bethiah) is from Connecticut and arrived in Minnesota in 1857.

She is buried next to her husband in Monticello. Believe the cemetary to be the one behind the Perkins - Lot 176 was taken by John Smith August 20, 1873. Paid A.F. Barker 8/29/1873. Bethiah Smith died 8/19/1873, buried 8/21/1873 at age 63. (From old Monticello Cemetary Record Book in City Clerk's Office.)

Her name is spelled other ways including Bethrah. Her death certificate spells her name Bethia.

If I lean to favoring the Smith side first, that's my prerogative. I visited the Fergus Falls museum in 1978. They have a lot of pre-1870 material, but there seems to be a gap until about 1833 but I did find in the short time I browsed that Billy W. Smith (William Youlen) was the first teacher in Fergus, 1871. Charles W. Smith was a policeman, 1885.

Also in the museum is a replica of "Smith's Book and Toy Store". Never heard Mom mention a store of that type, but William and Charles could have been involved.

In 9/20/1850 Census Town of Geneva, Bloomfield Township, Walworth County, WI, listed as 12 year old male in 1850 census on page 37, Dwelling No. 833, Family No. 844.

Patient in Fergus Falls State Hospital for the Insane in 1900. (found in Nat'l Archives). Don't know for sure if it is our William Smith.

From the Saga written by Jessie Maud Smith-Hall:

Father (John Amos Smith) had two brothers; William Y. known to everyone as Billy Smith, and Charlie, who with their families lived in Fergus. Our relations with them were of the usual pleasure and pain experienced when many relatives, some of jealous dispositions, live near each other.

Father (John Amos Smith) bought out Uncle Billy's confectionary store and shooting gallery on Lincoln Avenue and we lived in a house directly across the river on Bismarck Ave. We got quite a thrill out of having to cross the river on one of those big bridges every time we went into the store or to school, and loved to stand on them and listen to the noises of the falls and the old Cale Mill and the Otter Tail Mill, flour mills that stood at the ends of the bridges. We had the usual unease of adjusting ourselves to the larger schools and before the winter was over, I was so homesick I was actually physically ill. Mother was worried and promised me that during the Easter vacation I should go back to Detroit on a visit.

John Amos came to Montana in 1899 from Bottineau, ND with his sons Charles A, Lamont L, and Arthur C. John Amos died Sept. 29, 1900. He married Sarah Catherine Bogenrief July 7, 1855. John Amos was a farmer in Simpson, MT.

Per saga of Jesse Maud Smith-Hall:

Uncle Charlie (Smith) (have copy of his Civil War records) and Uncle Ron (Randall Smith?) enlisted in the Army early in the Civil War and Dad (John Amos Smith), who in the meantime had married, decided to do the same. So one morning he said goodbye to the family and the farm and went to town. He was disappointed and proceeded to take a few drinks to bolster his spirits. When he

got home and mother dropped the tea kettle cover, he didn't try to pick it up for he could see two covers. Mother (Sarah Catherin Bogenrief-Smith) saw his condition, of course, and later when he missed her he found her in the hay mow, crying her heart out. That was the last time my father ever was drunk.

Shortly after the war, the Fullers sent John Amos Smith to establish and run a store at Clearwater, MN. There 5 girls (Carrie, Alma, Edith, Jessie & Elsie) and another boy (LaMont) were added to the family.

I was sixth in line and made my appearance July 13, 1869, and was named Jessie Maud (Smith).

The Northern Pacific Railroad was not in the process of being constructed and had reached Detroit, now known as Detroit Lakes. Fuller Brothers must have had a penchant for following the Frontier with their business, for when I was 4 years old and sister Elsie had been added to the family, we went to Detroit in a coach attached to a freight train, and were the first passengers to be carried over the line.

Two carloads of goods went with us to be sold from a store that was supposed to have been built before our arrival. A log cabin, also, was to have been ready for our occupancy. But when we detrained, the only house to be seen was a long log hotel, known as the Tyler House and run by a family named Wheeler. After a long day spent in covering a distance that is now traveled in 4 or 5 hours. The rest was just a city of tents. There the railroad workers were living; also the usual flotsam and jets that follows the frontier, and many, many Indians.

Installing the family in the cramped quarters of the hotel, father soon had a crew at work erecting a log building near the hotel for a store and a two story, two roomed log cabin for a home. The cabin stood on the opposite side of the track from the store and on top of a small knoll. In after years, we sometimes went down the track to this cabin for our Sunday afternoon walks, and I can remember how it looked when the windows and doors had all disappeared and the stairway had been half torn away.

As the railroad pushed on and more and more people came, the town grew up a mile west of the Tyler House and thereafter the location of the hotel was called Tylerville. I have always supposed that an early pioneer named Tyler built the house but of that I am not sure.

Father moved his store up the line and we lived for a time in a house that the family always referred to in after years as the Trimlet house. The town grew up on both sides of the railroad track and about a mile north of the lake.

I can just remember Bill Trimlet as a round roly poly young man with rosy cheeks and a constant smile who never seemed to quite belong with the other young people but I don't know why.

I do not know when nor why my father left the store, but for some years he worked at the

trade of carpentering. We lived in a house at the foot of schoolhouse hill so we could always go home for dinner, much to my distress, for it looked so good to see that row of dinner pails sitting along the wall in the hall as we were dismissed at noon that I longed to stay and eat with their owners. I hurried my dinner to get back to play with Ida and Arvilla Rossman and Emily Southam, Will and Isaac Brooks, George and Walter Tousley, and others. The teachers I best remember are Lizzie Hayes, an Irish girl whose family lived on a farm near Lake Park, a village a few miles of the railroad from Detroit. I realize now that Lizzie was far superior to many of our teachers. She boarded with the Taylor family which consisted of father and mother (both small thin individuals) and two small thin daughters, Lillian (who was a fine little women) and Georgie (who was a petted, spoiled and conceited little prig). They also boarded two men, John Dorsey (conductor on the work train working out from Detroit) and Clarence Farwell (fireman on the same train).

John Dorsey was often in Lizzie's company, sitting on the steps in the evening or walking along the roads, and it was the general opinion of the town that they would soon be married. But it developed that John was engaged to a girl in Bamerd whom he afterward married and Lizzie never did marry. John Dorsey was a large, genial, fine looking Irish-man who was liked by all who knew him and was loved by all the children with who he came in contact. He would take a group of us into Pegleg Inman's confectionary store and taking one orange at a time from the basket standing on the showcase, would toss it up for us to catch until everyone was supplied.

When Pegleg brought the first bunch of bananas that ever came into Detroit, John took half-a-dozen of us in and gave us each one. Then he stood and laughed while we tried to pretend we liked them. But these things were a real treat for us for our parents were poor people and had no money for luxuries. My father made about \$50 a month for a family of ten and he always had a good garden. This, with the help of a cow and a few chickens and my mother's wonderful cooking ability, kept us living but sometimes on pretty short rations. I can remember some days when all we had to eat was bread laced with sugar syrup.

We usually had one or two boarders. Walter Wheeler, who was then a blacksmith, was with us two or three years and was always way behind in payment of his board bill, although he had a big trade. Later Frank Heustis acted the same, so I think my parents were too easy going for their own good. Frank had a span of beautiful gray horses and did the draying for the stores and made money enough to buy a house, after which he married my sister Edith. So there was no excuse for his neglecting his board bill.

Father was Superintendent of the Methodist Sunday School, held in the Congregational Church for some years before the Methodist Church was built. He was ably assisted by Mrs. C.K. Day, who took charge of the singing and entertainments and who gave me a solid foundation in music for which I have been extremely thankful all my life.

When my father decided to move to Fergus Falls, MN the spring before I (Jessie Maud Smith-Hall) was 16, there were the 3 brothers (Charles, LaMont and Arthur-called Gus), LaMont, and Art, and sisters Alma, Elsie and myself to go with father and mother. Alma

was teaching school in Detroit but took a week's vacation the first of May to help us to get moved. We left Detroit by train about 10 o'clock in the evening and rode to Wadena where we had to wait till 7 the next morning for the train on the N.P. (Northern Pacific) branch running through Fergus Falls. The fire in the coal stove in the hotel parlor was nearly out, the chairs straight backed and uncomfortable and we were only too glad to be called to breakfast at 6 o'clock in a dining room that was deliciously warm. Travel in those days was not carried on in comfortable passenger trains as at present, but we rode in a coach attached to the end of a freight train. At every station we were left on a side track while the engine and crew did the necessary switching then picked up and carried to the next station where the same procedure was again carried out. It was nearly noon when we reached Fergus Falls, having taken five hours to cover the distance that motor cars of today run over in less than an hour. The Otter Tail River runs from east to west thru the main business section of Fergus. Lincoln Avenue parallels it on the north end Bismarck Ave. on the south, and these were the two main business streets.

Father had two brothers; William Y. known to everyone as Billy Smith, and Charlie, who with their families lived in Fergus. Our relations with them were of the usual pleasure and pain experienced when many relatives, some of jealous dispositions, live near each other.

Father bought out Uncle Billy's confectionary store and shooting gallery at 215 Lincoln Avenue. We lived in a house directly across the river on Bismarck Ave. (Grant Colling, Avis Swanson's grandson, owns building down the street and across from John Amos' store in Fergus Falls, MN.) We got quite a thrill out of having to cross the river on one of those big bridges every time we went into the store or to school, and loved to stand on them and listen to the noises of the falls and the old Cale Mill and the Otter Tail Mill, flour mills that stood at the ends of the bridges. We had the usual unease of adjusting ourselves to the larger schools and before the winter was over, I was so homesick I was actually physically ill. Mother was worried and promised me that during the Easter vacation I should go back to Detroit on a visit.

In 6/12/1860 census lived in Monticello, Wright County, MN with John C. and Bethiah Smith. He was 28, listed as son, member of household.

On Elsie's birth certificate John Amos is listed as a merchant who was born in NY.

Was a clerk (merchant) for Fuller Brothers in Monticello and then in Clearwater, MN.

John Amos' one fault was that he was too friendly with his customers, credit-wise, and he was the nurse of the family. He taught them the songs, did the washing and most of the cooking. He faithfully kept the Sabbath and would not abide with working on that day.

John Amos moved to Havre, Montana in 1899 from Bottineau, ND with his 3 sons and their families: Charles A. Smith & family of 4 children, Lamont L. Smith and family of 2 children, and Arthur C. Smith (single). They came by immigrant train car, bringing with

them their kitchen utinsels, livestock and what machinery they had.

After arriving in Havre, they proceeded by team and wagon in a northwesterly direction for 2 or 3 days. It is believed that their first location was at the mouth of the Spring Coulee on Milk River. This is about 40 miles from Havre.

They raised stock and after 2 years, during which time their father John Amos Smith, died, the 3 brothers pulled stakes and moved to Wild Horse Lake, about 10 miles away, where they planned on harvesting wild hay for the winter feeding of their livestock. (see Charles A. Smith for more of the story)

From The Project by Kathryn Swanson:

Dad (Albert V. Swanson) must have known Grandfather Amos because he said once that Afton was just like him---always blowing and not knowing what he was talking about. But I also remember Mom saying that Grandpa always objected to all the kids' marriages and would have probably said she was marrying a green Swede.

My (Kathryn) impression of John Amos from Mom (Elsie) was he was a bullheaded non-provider who couldn't hold a job because he couldn't take orders. From Aunt Jess I got an entirely different picture. He was the nurse of the family, taught them the songs, did the washing and most of the cooking, and was too friendly to his customers creditwise so he was fired. Sarah was the breadwinner as a dressmaker and milliner. She was devastated with migraines. She associated with only the best people. In spite of her headaches, she did have 8 children! She died of cancer of the throat at 50. As I said, John Amos thought no one was good enough for his girls. He bitterly opposed Jess's choice. He faithfully kept the Sabbath. Once Alma, Carrie and Grandmother decided to lay a rug on Sunday, trying to do it secretly, but when John Amos got an inkling of what they were doing behind that locked door, there was a real uproar.

Family bible lists Sarah's middle name as Catharine, born 9/29/1837. Other Opal Halla info rec'd 3/1999 lists Sarah's father as Bernard Bogenrief, b. 1811, Miflenberg, PA, married to Elizabeth Buler, b. 1815 in Miflenberg, PA. This is wrong - especially per register below from Dorothy Cromett-Whitt.

Sarah C. Smith - a dearly beloved wife and mother, a great but patient sufferer for 9 months, for 6 months could not take but a very little nourishment and in the shape of liquids only, for the last 12 days before her death could taken none, in fact it was a slow lingering death of 6 months.

The Project By Kathryn Elizabeth Swanson (born 12/24/1912 in Minot, ND) Daughter of Elsie Elizabeth Smith (who was daughter of John Amos Smith and Sarah Bogenrief-Smith):

Sarah was 18 when her sister Kate was to go as a bride with Sam Dimon to Minnesota. Sarah's mother Elizabeth Bliler couldn't bear to have her daughter amongst the savages with no woman along, so she sent Sarah along. Sarah spoke no english. As she came down from the loft to do some kitchen chores, John Amos Smith saw her and when she went back up the ladder, he said, "That's the girl I'm going to marry." As she spoke nothing but the Pennsylvania Dutch, how could she say no.

The Family Saga - by Jessie Maud (Smith Hall):

When my mother (Sarah Catherine Bogenrief-Smith), a brown eyed, brown haired, plump little Dutch girl, who talked only the language of her parents, was 18 years of age, her older sister, Kate, married Sam Dimon and moved to Marengo, IL.

Grandmother Bogenrief could not bear to have Kate go without another woman with her so sent mother (Sarah) to keep her company. The Indians were still troublesome so when Sam Dimon built his carpenter shop, he built living rooms above it that did not have an outside stairway for the "red varmints" to creep up. The stairway, therefore, came right down into the shop.

One afternoon when mother (Sarah) came down to gather up some shavings to start the fire for supper, father (John Amos Smith) was in the shop and saw her for the first time. He watched her until she disappeared up the stairs, then turning to Sam, he said, "Sam, I'm going to marry that girl". And a year later he did so.

In 6/12/1860 census lived in Monticello, Wright County, MN with John C. and Bethiah Smith. She was 22, lived with her husband and child (John A. and Charles A.) members of household.

Sarah is recalled by family members as being the breadwinner of the family as a dressmaker and milliner with her own shop. A regal and dignified woman up to the time of her death, she associated with only "the best people". (info from Allie Thompson 118 Yosemite Los Alamos, NM 87544-3442 10/1995).

Mother (Sarah Bogenrief-Smith) had been ailing for some time and in September, father and Alma took her to St. Paul for medical treatment, and after an operation, she died.

OBITUARY FROM FERGUS FALLS DAILY JOURNAL TUESDAY, AUGUST 30,1887 (Fergus Falls, MN)

Funeral of Mrs. John Smith:

The funeral of Mrs. Sarah Smith, wife of John Smith, was held this forenoon. The ladies of the Grace Methodist Episcopal church, of which she was a member, arranged beautiful floral offerings. Rev. J. B. Hingeley, her pastor, had charge of the services. Mrs. Smith was born in Pennsylvania, Sept. 29, 1887, being but one month less than 50 years old. When 7 years old she removed with her parents to Illinois, where she remained until July, 1955, when she married Mr. John Smith and removed with him to Minnesota. During the thirty-two years of their married life Mr. and Mrs. Smith lived at Monticello, Clearwater, Detroit and Fergus Falls. They have had eight children, three sons and five daughters. One of the daughters died some years ago, leaving little Flossie, to whom her grandmother has always been a tender mother. One daughter and two sons are living in Dakota. Another daughter, Mrs. Farwell, was with her mother in Minneapolis when she died, and the three younger children are at home. Mrs. Smith has been a quiet patient sufferer for many months. In fact, so patient was she that few thought her trouble was as serious as it was. About ten days ago she was sent to Minneapolis for treatment, but nothing could be done; the cancer was incurable and soon carried her away. The community sympathizes with the afflicted ones in their trouble.

Uncle Charlie (Smith) (Brenda Franklin has copy of his Civil War records) and Uncle Ron (Randall Smith?) enlisted in the Army early in the Civil War and Dad (John Amos Smith), who in the meantime had married, decided to do the same. So one morning he said goodbye to the family and the farm and went to town. But the enlisting officers told him that they needed him to raise food on the farm worse than in the Army and refused to take him. He was disappointed and proceeded to take a few drinks to bolster his spirits. When he got home and mother dropped the tea kettle cover, he didn't try to pick it up for he could see two covers. Mother (Sarah Catherin Bogenrief-Smith) saw his condition, of course, and later when he missed her he found her in the hay mow, crying her heart out. That was the last time my father ever was drunk.

Father (John Amos Smith) had two brothers; William Y. known to everyone as Billy Smith, and Charlie, who with their families lived in Fergus. Our relations with them were of the usual pleasure and pain experienced when many relatives, some of jealous dispositions, live near each other.

In 1890 census, special schedule surviving soldiers, sailors, marines and S.D. 4 E.D. 488 Minor Civl Division Fergus Falls. House #191, Family 192, Charles W. Smith, 2nd Lieutenant, D or II, Name of Regiment: 1 Minn HA (heavy artillery). Date of enlistment 4/23/1861. Discharge 9/27/1865 (4 years 5 months). Had Fergus Falls address.

From Pension Records received in the Washington, DC archives:

Parents: John C. & Bethiah Smith Born 3/10 1840, not 1841 in NYC, NY 5'6" 14 lbs dark hair, dark eyes.

During Civil War was Infantry. D1 Minn. Inf. also listed as D & B1 Minn. HA (heavy artillery). He was 2nd Lieutenant Heavy Artillery 4/23/1861 to 5/4/1864 and 2/25/1865 to 9/27/1865. In 1899 in Fergus Falls (Ottertail County) received \$8 per month for heart disease, diarrhea, rheumatism/disability.

He was a printer. He then lived in Mpls, St. Cloud, Fergus Falls, and Grafton, ND. April 11, 1907 he was 66 years old and lived in Kenmare, ND.

November 1911 he lived in Miami, Florida. In 1915 he was in Miami (Dade County) Florida. In 1916 he lived at 927 Avenue D, Miami, FL.

He died 9/23/1933 at 93 years 6 months 13 days of uremiah/senility. He was buried in Woodlawn Park by Combs Funeral Service in Miami.

CHARLIE/GUS' AUGUSTUS OR AUGUSTA³ SMITH (*JOHN AMOS*², *JOHN COOPER*¹) was born April 29, 1859 in Marengo, McHenry Cty, IL (or Clearwater, IL), and died July 20, 1943 in Simpson, Hill Cty, MT - buried in Spring Coulee Cemetery, Simpson, MT. He married EUGENIA MARIE 'JENNIE OR GEN' BARREL OR BARIL January 01, 1894 in Bottineau, ND, daughter of CAMILE BARIL and MARIE BLAIS.

Notes for Charles 'Charle/Gus' Augustus or Augusta Smith: John Amos moved to Havre, Montana in 1899 from Bottineau, ND with his 3 sons and their families: Charles A. Smith & family of 4 children, Lamont L. Smith and family of 2 children, and Arthur C. Smith (single). They came by immigrant train car, bringing with them their kitchen utensels, livestock and what machinery they had.

After arriving in Havre, they proceeded by team and wagon in a northwesterly direction for 2 or 3 days. It is believed that their first location was at the mouth of the Spring Coulee on Milk River. This is about 40 miles from Havre.

They raised stock and after 2 years, during which time their father John Amos Smith died, the 3 brothers pulled stakes and moved to Wild Horse Lake, about 10 miles away, where they planned on harvesting wild hay for the winter feeding of their livestock.

Wild Hose Lake today is in Northern Hill County. At the time the Smith's moved there the whole county was Chouteau County and Fort Benton was the county seat. In later years, as the country became more and more settled, it was divided into smaller counties as it now stands.

Havre, the nearest trading post, was 40 miles away. The only transportation was team and wagon, saddle horse, or walking. They did not seem to mind because that was the way of the land and they did not know any different. It took 4 days to make one trip and you had to carry your own camp outfit and feed and hobble for your horses. So 2 or 3 trips a year was all the "town going" they did.

All 3 brothers were satisfied with their new location, so Charles and Arthur filed homesteads and went to raising horses. They built their home, a mansion about 18 x 24 ft, on Charles' homestead. Living in this mansion must have been quite a problem because there were 5 grownups and 6 children in the group. As soon as they were settled in their new home, they proceeded to break some sod so they could raise some grain for their livestock and a garden. About this time Chief Snickernose was passing by with his tribe, saw them breaking sod with their 3 horses and walking plow, because it was the Chief who made the remark, "White man damm fool. Turn grass upside down. Pony no can eat." During these early days it was very common to see Indian families passing by.

Sometime later they built another larger home 3/4 mile west and about 250 yards to the

north of Arthur's claim. This house was about 20 x 30 feet. After sheeting the side walls with rough lumber, they encased it in sod. This sod was plowed from the low places where the grass roots were thickest. The roof was covered with about 6 inches of brush and dirt.

It was here that on 9/10/1902 Mr. and Mrs. Charles Smith was blessed with their first daughter, Amy (who married Anton Schritz and moved to Minnesota in later years). Amy was the first baby white girl born on Wild Horse Lake.

During a day's ride through the country you could see several bands of sheep, hundreds of cattle and horses owned by such old timers as Sam Pippen, Abe Crossen, Simpson, Sims, Wallace, and others who deserve honorable mention.

The first school was held at the A.W. Sims ranch - 3 miles away in a small building which in later years Mr. Sims used for a garage. After a few years, a school house about 16 x 24 ft. with a porch entrance was built about 250 yards south of the sod covered house, and a new yards east.

In 1905, Lamont L. Smith decided he had had enough, so he and his family pulled stakes again and went to Eureka where they resided for many years.

Wild animals were plentiful, especially antelope. You could see them almost anytime in the distance. But the winter of 1906 and 1907 was a very hard winter. Reports are that it was 50 or 60 degrees below zero a lot of the time, lots of wind, and 3 or 4 feet of badly crusted snow on the prairies which killed thousands of antelope, as well as a lot of cattle and horses.

It was about this time when Charles went to Fort Benton and bought a nice black bull for his small herd of cattle. When he got home, he turned the bull loose on the prairie with his cattle. You could do this with bulls, but not with horse "stallions". Stallions were kept in a stable or fenced area. One neighbor to the SE had a stallion, classified later as a "broomtailed coyuse", running loose on the prairie. He was notified several times about the law and he ignored it. The Smiths were trying to raise well-bred percheron horses so when the "Coyuse" came over, he went back a gelding. In a few days Smith's nice black bull came home a steer. Then when the Smith's asked him about it, he says, "Ya, you cut my bull horse -- I cut your bull cow". But he was made to pay for the bull.

In the spring of 1910, the homestead "mansion" of Charles was moved to the present location. Charles and his family moved there for the summer while he build the house now standing. Arthur married the school teacher, when school was over so he retained the "sod house" since it was on his claim. Charles Smith & family moved in the new house that fall. In the years ahead it was often referred to as the "hotel".

The "mansion" was converted into a blacksmith shop wehre Charles did his own blacksmith work, as well as for all the neighbors, incluing shoeing horses for the Royal Canadian Mounted Police who were stationed just across the border. This shop was still standing in 1965.

School was real handy for the Smiths and it remained so until the fall of 1915, when the school was set afire and burned down. Jesse Marsden just started to teach her second term there when this happened and she lost all of her personal school supplies. There was no more school in these parts then until 1919 when the school named the Plainview was built.

The winter of 1910-1911 was another dilly - cold and windy with lots of snow. It took its toll of livestock too, as did the year before. Horses, cattle, antelope, and anything left on the range.

About 1912 Arthur sold to Charles and moved to Butte, Montana. A few years later that old sod house was torn down and the lumber used to build a horse barn at the present site.

From about 1911 to 1916, people from all parts of the eastern U.S., a few from England, and other foreign countries came out to Montana, Nebraska & the Dakotas and filed claims on homesteads. A half section (320 acres) was the maximum land allowed for a homestead. Since practically all half sections were filed on, the homestead shacks were plentiful. These homesteaders, some with money and some without, seemed to like the taste of wild meat because during these few years the antelope "fought" a losing battle. Between the homesteaders and the old timers, the antelope disappeared completely from the prairies. From about 1918 they were a real curiosity until 1933 when they started to come back and have been developing fairly good ever since.

The settlers, coming in so thick and fast, bringing with them what stock and machinery they could, filing on so much of the land, building fences around their claims. The old timers called the fences stock "wire traps". The fences forced almost all stockmen out of business. Some of the sheepmen stuck with it and through hard work and planning were able to stay in business for a number of years more.

About 1914 Charles Smith traded a team of horses for a fairly good line of farm machinery and began farming. Since he was raising horses for several years, he had several teams broke for work and he sold them to the settlers. Of course the Bunton, Simpson and Mariette brothers were also raising and selling horses. So the settlers, referred to by the stockmen as "hon-yockers", were well supplied.

1915 and 1916 were good wet years. Those few farmers who had a crop in, harvested a fair return. At this time 100 acres was a very large crop and very few had that much. But the dry years that followed told a different story. 1917 and 1918 were very dry some settlers gave up and pulled out. World War I was in full swing at this time and a great number of them joined the army. Guy Smith, the second oldest boy, was one of them. After the war was over in 1919, some of them never came back. Quite a few did come back and continued farming for awhile. But the next few years were about as dry as they ever came that really separated the men from the boys. The system of using horses for farming proved to be no good because they could not do a good job. The land was just naturally too dry. It would have been just right if you didn't want over

production, if you didn't want to profess, and if you didn't care if you slowly starved to death. The Smiths did not starve to death, but a few times they got kinda gaunt.

In 1918 some liquor business people from Havre opened and operated a saloon in their homestead shack on the Canadian border, located north of the Smiths. Canada was "dry" at this time, so bootlegging became the big thing. Cars were getting more plentiful and were put to use, as well as teams of horses and wagons, hauling this liquor into Canada. This went on for about a year or so and then prohibition cane to the U.S. and Canada went "wet". This put bootlegging in reverse and also, it increased about 50 times in the Wild Horse sector alone. It also created a little excitement at times for the people involved. One of these times was when 4 men from Great Falls with 2 cars stopped in at the Smiths to have 4 bullet holes patched in their gas tank. They told the story that "hijackers" tried to get them. Their cars seemed to be heavily loaded, but they didn't offer any explanation and the Smith's didn't ask.

Another time the Smith's neighbor to the south got his face severely peeled for interfering with some Havre bootleggers' operations. This same neighbor used to come over to the Smiths quite often on his bicycle to visit. On one of these visits, Chief Snickernose saw him and was heard to remark, "White man crazy, work feet like hell to give ass a ride". Another story told at that time was of a local farmer who went out to a field to get a load of straw. When he stopped at the straw stack, he noticed a foot sticking out of the straw. Thinking someone must have drank too much and crawled into sleep it off, he tickled the foot with the fork handle. Getting no response, he called a few times and then pulled the man out of the straw. The mad had been dead for several hours, apparently a bootlegger victim. Prohibition put an end to the "border" saloon.

So in 1924, looking across the country, you could see only about one settler's shack in an area where ten used to be. All the old plowed fields were in weeds, Russian thistles, some of them more than 3 feet across. When they ripened, the high winds would blow them off the fields into the fences, which caused such a pressure, it tore the fences down and scattered them all over the prairie. This caused quite a livestock problem. The Smiths had 2 horses severely cut by the wire. Another horse got tied down with it and laid down and died. In due time these fences disappeared. Some of the fences that had quite a weed growth, collected the blowing sand. After a few years, the fences were almost buried. Smiths raised a few of these weeds according the amount of fence-line burning, and harrow burning they did, as well as the rebuilding of fences. In later years, though - 20 or more later - a lot of these old plowed fields turned back to grass, but not too good.

About this time the price of horses when down to zero and stayed there ever since. The Smiths had about 50 head, but through neglect, they petered out and disappeared. In the late 1920s, the farmers turned to tractor farming. The Smiths didn't change over til about 1934. From then on it was just the daily routine of farm life.

In the fall of 1918, at the age of 23, Lamont W., the oldest of the Smith kids, went to Butte, Montana and has resided there ever since.

In January 1919, the last child, a boy, was born to the Smiths, making 15 of them being born in Montana - 19 in all. 12 were still living in 1965.

In 1919, World War I ended and Guy came home. He stayed around home for awhile, then went to farm in Minnesota (he signed a Chattel Mortgage with his sister Amy's husband Anton (Tony) Schritz in Rothsay, MN 1928-1932). After several years of farming, he finally wound up on the West Coast where he worked in defense work during WW II. After a few years he his health failed and he died in 1959. In March 1965 his sister Eunice Smith also passed away.

Charles A. Smith died at the age of 84 in July 1943. His wife died at age 80 in August 1955. She left 39 grandchildren and nearly that many great grandchildren.

Obituary of Eugenia Smith - Mother of 19 Children

Simpson resident dies in Shelby, Monday on her 81st birthday.

The past year she had been living with her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Smith, at Sunburst. Mrs. Smith passed away at their home.

Mrs. Smith was married to Charles A. Smith on 1/1/1892 in Bottineau, ND. They had 19 children. Her husband died 7/20/1943.

They came to the area NW of Havre, MT known as Spring Coulee and located there on Milk River in 1899. In 1900 they moved to Oldham, area known in later years as Simpson where they homesteaded. In 1900 Mrs. Smith moved with her family up to the Simpson community from Bottineau. Since that year until a year ago, she resided on a homestead north of Simpson.

A few interesting incidents during their early days on the homestead - she did all the

cooking and baking for the entire family. She was noted for her cooking and bread making, using as high as 400 lbs of flour a month. At one time she had 9 children in school and did all the cooking for a 10 bundle team threshing crew during harvest. The sons related how their mother often recalled that there was a period of 18 months on the ranch when she did not see another woman except a sister-in-law. There was also a period when she did not get to town for a stretch of 12 years.

In the early days, hardships were great on the dry land farms. There was no communication system and transportation was by horseback or the old lumber wagon. There were no modern conveniences. Still Mrs. Smith raised her large family and had time to be a friendly, helpful neighbor. During World War I she knitted numerous sweaters and socks for servicemen.

One of Mrs. Smith's daughters, Amy (Mrs. Tony Schritz of Rothsay, MN), was the first white girl born in the Simpson community.

Surviving are sons LaMonte (Butte), Guy (Sausalito, CA), Irving (Roseburg, OR), Allan (Rudyard), Glenn (Malta), Fred (Sunburst), George (Simpson), Don (Shelby) and daughters Amy (Mrs. Tony Schritz of Rothsay, MN), Iva (Mrs. Irling Simms of Malta), Julia (Mrs. Elva Ulven of Tioga, ND), Eunice (Mrs. James Chrisholm of Columbia Falls), Sarah (Mrs. James Rogers of Butte), Josephine (Mrs. Stanley Loughlin of Fairfield), and 39 grand children and 16 great-grandchildren.

5 other children precede Mrs. Smith in death. Funeral services are scheduled for Friday at 11 AM in the Holland and Bonine funeral home. Rev. Richard Vick of the Van Orsdel Methodist Church officiated. Internment will be in the family lot in the Simpson Cemetery. (Have photo of grave marker.)

From Saga by Jessie Maud Smith-Hall:

We usually had one or two boarders. Walter Wheeler, who was then a blacksmith, was with us two or three years and was always way behind in payment of his board bill, although he had a big trade. Later Frank Heustis acted the same, so I think my parents were too easy going for their own good. Frank had a span of beautiful gray horses and did the draying for the stores and made money enough to buy a house, after which he married my sister Edith. So there was no excuse for his neglecting his board bill.

When I was 10 years old, my oldest sister (Carrie) married Walter Wheeler. A year later she died when her baby girl was born. They name the baby Florence Carrie and my mother took her home and raised here with the rest of us, so she has always seemed more like a sister than a niece. She married Clyde Miller of Staples, Minnesota and all of my family still loves to visit "Floss" and Clyde. (Floss died of cancer in 1948.) Two years later my sister Edith married Frank Heustis, one of a Boston colony who settled along the southern shore of Detroit Lakes and had boarded with my parents (see previous page above).

It is seldom indeed that a newspaper is called upon to record a sadder case than the above. On the 23rd day of last May, Miss Carrie M. Smith was led to the mariage altar, by Walter J. Wheeler. All was happiness at that time to the pair, and the future seemed to have in store naught but brightness. But life is a lottery at best, and it is not within the power of human beings to say "how long these things shall be." In less than one year from the time she pledged her heart and hand, Mrs. Wheeler leaves a beautiful little daughter of only eleven days old, and "crosses that bourne from whence no traveler returns." Someone once told a Smith that he had facial characteristics of the Mohawk Indians and from that grew the legend of our Indian blood. Then someone claimed it was a Mohawk princess. So I always claimed it for shock purposes, but last summer I picked up a good one. Alma Smith raised Carrie Smith's daughter Florence (Floss) and Floss' daughter Jess told me that Alma had told Floss that she was part Indian. As Alma was one of the oldest in the family, she just may have gotten it from her folks while the younger ones just got hints. So was it Bethia or was John Cooper's father fooling around? From Saga written by Jessie Maud Smith-Hall:

The third incident isn't entirely a memory but is partly sustained by talks in the family but is this: Alma was born tongue-tied. When father and mother (Mr. & Mrs. John Amos Smith) took her to Dr. Wheelock to have this remedied, they must have taken Gus (Arthur Cooper Smith) and me along for I can remember being carried in Gus' arms back and forth on a fine covered porch while waiting.

In after years, father often said that having Alma's tongue cut loose was the big mistake of his life for he learned too late that it was hung in the middle and clacked at both ends. One day, while father was shaving, Alma ran to him laughing about something and he stuffed his shaving brush - full of soap suds - right into her mouth. It may have been fun for him, but was she mad!

Alma had married Clarence Farwell, an engineer on the Fergus branch of the Northern Pacific (N.P.). He had been a boarder when he was a fireman on the train out from Detroit. In April she and I went back and spent a week at Edith's. Even in that short time, just a year, things had changed there or I had changed enough so I was glad when the time came to go home and never cared to go back.

Mother had been ailing for some time and in September, Father and Alma took her to St. Paul for medical treatment, and after an operation, she died.

Dad (A.V. Swanson) was County Commissioner. That's where he got his clout for Aunt Ede's job. Many tales fascinated us about Drs. Devine, Kermott, Erenfeld, Ringo Pence, and Newlove (our doctor and her favorite). She didn't like Erenfeld because she though his skin grafting was cruel -- experimenting, she called it. I think he was Austrian trained and probably a bit ahead of hit time in techniques. She nursed many of the doctor's wives through their confinements. Nursing at that time meant taking over the management of the whole house in many instances. She also took care of many families during the 1918 flue epidemic. Ida Van Fleet remembers that she was with them for months.

So I may as well tell more about "Aunt" at this time. After leaving Minnesota to come out here to homestead, the folks lost track of much that was going on within their families. Dad was a better correspondent than Mom, but his was usually a birthday letter and not always every year. Until Aunt Ede got sick in the early 30's, we had little touch with Aunt Jess. In 1930 the three sisters did get together at Aunt Alma's and later on, the four were at our house (about 1932). They had the two bedrooms and it was really something to listen to the four snoring--- a real quartet with 4 distinct levels of sound. But again I digress---Aunt was "aunt" for years because she was the only one we met until about 1925. She was the middle child. Alma and Carrie would say, "Let's see who can dress first and take care of the babies." She always won and said she was so dumb that she never caught on! That left them free to be the "ladies" and go to the milliner shop with their mother. However, she was the nurse of the family and probably enjoyed her role. Alma had a suitor, Frank Heustis, and in Edith's make believe games, she always spoke of her husband as Frank H. She had the least education of all the girls, but she was an avid reader and all of the Smith's had good grammar and vocabulary. She

had two long spells of illness as a child and later diagnosed one as a burst appendix which drained itself off through the bowel. Dr. Newlove heard her telling his wife that and said, "Very good, Mrs. H. You are probably right." Another spell left her with aching knees and as she said, it was probably inflammatory rheumatism. Anyway, she was plagued all her life with a bad heart. She did marry Frank Heustis and was widowed young when he was struck by an engine while working on the railroad. She supported her kids by sewing and nursing. She homesteaded with the folks.

In 1904 Diphtheria struck Clarabelle, the 2nd child. Dad went for Aunt and they came out of Minot with enough vaccine for everyone but one. Aunt Ede insisted that the others get it as she could get more back in Minot. The delay was almost fatal, for she contracted it and almost died. Clarabelle died. Aunt told me that Mother always blamed herself but why was never clear to me. Anyway, it was a closed subject and never discussed until many, many years later.

When Ralph's marriage broke up, he was left with Armine......and Duane...Aunt Ede went to Devils Lake to live with Ralph and raise the boys until her death from breast cancer in 1934. She used to visit us at least once a year and often twice or more when she was in Minot to "sew us up". We 3 girls good dresses were mostly cleverly madeovers and we wore them with price because she was a real stylist. Dad had gotten a bargain on 2 bolts of flowered light material some time before I can remember, but I do know that I made up the last of the blue for summer school in 1931. It had been sitting around during the more affluent middle 20s. The main drawback was that though it made up into beautiful dresses, you had to stay clean! It faded fast and by the 4th washing, you had a white dress. And no deodorants!!! We washed a lot!!!!

Other things I remember about Aunt's visits. She had a great love of mushrooms and, if they were around, she'd find them and also gathered wild greens. Also we always demanded noodles and she always obliged. She would never stay too long. That was the first I was introduced to the phrase "wearing out your welcome'. She was so right because though she herself never did, Armin could never stay on his good behavior more than a week at a time and we were exposed to one of his nasty temper tantrums and we were glad to see him go and then could hardly wait until their next visit.

She was a giving person and a natural born psychologist. She understood people. She, like Elsie, was a proud woman and like to associate with the better class.

Aunt Ede was an old woman at 60 - lived to 69.	

Edith was widowed young when her husband was struck by an engine while working on the railroad. She supported the children by sewing and nursing. They lived with her parents on the homestead.

Though afflicted with heart trouble and "bad knees" all her life, she died of breast cancer in 1934. She spent the last years of her life with her son Ralph in Devils Lake to help him raise his children. She is recalled as a loving and giving person, and one who

understood people and their needs.

We usually had one or two boarders. Walter Wheeler, who was then a blacksmith, was with us two or three years and was always way behind in payment of his board bill, although he had a big trade. Later Frank Heustis acted the same, so I think my parents were too easy going for their own good. Frank had a span of beautiful gray horses and did the draying for the stores and made money enough to buy a house, after which he married my sister Edith. So there was no excuse for his neglecting his board bill.

Two years later my sister Edith married Frank Heustis, one of a Boston colony who settled along the southern shore of Detroit Lakes and had boarded with my parents.

Jessie Maud Smith-Hall was Amy Schritz's aunt.

When I began going to school there was one 2-story, 2-room building built on a small hill

3 or 4 blocks north of the tracks. A small one-story, one-room building stood near by and housed the first and second grades. Kindergartens were unknown.

My brothers and sisters and I attended this school until I was 15 years old, and had a succession of teachers, good, bad and indifferent.

It must have been about the year 1881 when the first large brick building was erected. It stood a block south of the railroad track and covered a quarter of a block. The ground floor was used for two stores, a grocery store and a dry good store. Both were owned by Day & Wood and father went to work in the grocery department. The second floor was entirely taken up by an opera house, the largest one between St. Paul and Fargo. It was our privilege to hear some of the finest troops on the road for they all "made" Detroit for a one or two night stand to break the long ride to Fargo. We heard Mrs. Scott Siddone in her Shakespearean readings, the Lilipatian Opera Company in Jack the Giant Killer; several fine Negro Minstrel troops and many of lesser merit. In this room too, were held many fine balls where the "square dances" were the rule and the "round" dances the exception. The older sisters and I were allowed to go to the balls but were forbidden to dance the "round" dances because a man had to encircle a ladies waist with his arm to execute the "round" dance while in the square dance merely the hands touched. However, we all managed some way to learn to waltz, polka, and schottische and gradually the prohibitions against them were withdrawn.

It would seem strange now to see boys and girls, 11 or 12 years old, attending a public dance. But at that time the parents were mostly young people, usually with several children, and it was a case of either take the children or stay at home. "Baby-sitters" -- there were none.

When a new house, or even a big barn, was completed, the owner gave a "housewarming" inviting everybody to attend and making provisions for the children as well as the parents. One room was devoted to games for children, who didn't always "stay put". It was fun to slip into the older groups and watch them playing cards, checkers, or dominoes, and especially into the darkened room where several sat around a table with their hands joined on top of it, making it tip and dance and answer questions. We knew, of course, that it was ghosts who did all that and were glad to get back to the brighter rooms but really thrilled at having seen the ghostly demonstrations. Part of the night was devoted to dancing with Mr. Rossman playing the violin. Invariably sometime during the evening the crowd was entertained by my father and Mrs. Peasly "hoeing it down", trying to out jig each other and Mr. Rossman playing faster and faster.

Mother (Sarah Bogenreif-Smith) had been ailing for some time and in September, father (John Amos Smith) and Alma took her to St. Paul for medical treatment, and after an operation, she died.

After this I kept house for the family for over a year. Then, business being poor in the store, and neither of the older boys (Art was still in school) having steady work, I decided to take the teacher's examination and received a third grade certificate, which was all the county gave to an inexperienced teacher. The next April I began teaching in District

#1 in Old town, Cletherall, among the Mormons, who were the first settlers in Otter Tail County and had the first school. I taught three terms among them and found them an affectionate, humorous, honest people whose word was as good as their bond and many of whom I still count among my dearest friends. My wages were \$33 per month of which I paid \$10 for board until the last term of three months, when Mrs. Murdock, with whom I boarded and who never seemed to find time to do her ironing, offered to board me for \$8 if I would do the ironing. This I did and gave the extra \$6 to Elsie.

Grandma Sarah died in 1887 leaving Jess 17 and Elsie 15 to keep house for Charlie, Monte, Grandpa and Art (10). Jess left after 2 years of high school to teach -- she told me that it was to get some clothes for their backs -- and one of her anecdotes was:

"I was told to go see Mr.--- as he did all the teacher hiring and when I did, he told me to see the other board members. I said, "I was told you did the hiring, so what is it you don't like about me?" (Remember Sarah was only 5'2".) He said, "Well I'm tired of these 18 year old girls trying to teach these 17 year old boys -- it always makes trouble." I removed my hat and showed by streak of gray hair and said, "I'm 21." She got the job.

Jessie attended summer school in Fergus and took the exam to obtain a second grade teaching certificate. They gave her a school in a Norwegian settlement at Carlysle, 8 miles west of Fergus. She received \$40 per month. Later she was offered a school at New York Mills, among the Finnish people, where her future husband was principal. They met a summer school and enjoyed meeting each other again. After a year spent in the Staples School, where Alma and Clarence lived, she returned to New York Mills, and then back again to Staples where she boarded half the time with Alma and the other half with Edith.

Alma had married Morris Cromett and was living in Pine River. Mr. Hall, Ruth, Margaret and I stayed in Kinmount all summer and in the fall we decided to put the insurance money into 40 acres on the edge of Ericsburg. We moved up there and lived in a 2-room shack while we built a house on the corner of "our forty". Then followed 10 years of ups and downs, mostly downs. The insurance had decreased from \$100 a quarter to \$35; work was scarce and both of the boys were idle much of the time. Mr. Hall spent his time clearing the land and getting up wood. I cooked in the hotels, sewed and did a lot of nursing - anything to help earn of living. I went to Duluth one summer and stayed a month on a maternity case. The next winter I went to Cloquet to nurse Mr. Hall's sister, Jennie Gellerman, and was with her until she died in June.

While I was there, Parker came down and secured work in the paper mill. He was married to Fannie Basso, built a home and they are still there, raising two fine boys.

Shortly after this, Ruth married Curtis Reid, and they went to Duluth to live. Margaret,

having finished the 8th grade, sister Alma and her daughter Mildred, took here to Virginia and kept her thru 4 years of high school work. She graduated in 1925.

Early that summer Clyde went to work as billing clerk at the M.D.W. depot (Mpls-Detroit-Winnipeg) in International Falls. He bought an old Model T and drove back to his work. But the next year they began reconstructing the road and it became impassible, so on Armistice Day, 1917, we moved to International Falls. Margaret was in her second year of training for nursing at the Northern Hospital and she was so glad to have us in town where she could dome home on her hours off.

Mr. Hall was taken sick in March 1927 and died the next September 1927. We lived 4 years in a small cottage on 9th Street and then came the depression. Clyde lost his job in January but had money enough to take care of himself. We gave up the house and I went to Virginia to live with Margaret, who was then city nurse. The next year I spent with the different children. Clyde was called back to work May 25th and shortly after he married and went to live out at Crystal Beach, driving in to his work every day.

"In 1932 I spent part of the winter in his home, but in April was called to Devils Lake, ND to care for my sister, Edith, who had cancer. I was with her nearly two years and then came back to International Falls and went to work keeping house for the Millard family, April 1, 1935, and spend 12 years with a family of the best friends I have ever had."

Now for Aunt Jess. She had all of Ede's understanding and warmth, but there was no discriminating for her. Mom and Aunt E. Would say in dismay, "Why Jess will talk to anybody". (How often Mom would say to me later on, "You talk too much and don't care to whom".) Well if I can have as nice things said about me now and after I've gone as she, I will be well content. Besides that to paraphrase, "Talkers have more fun. Aunt Jess lived a full life until 84.

Notes for HERBERT HENRY HALL: From Jessie Maud Smith-Hall Saga:

"Mr. Hall spent several weekends with me and the next summer we were married at Fergus Falls, MN. My husband was working for the American Book Co. for the summer

with headquarters at Sauk Center. September first he became principal of the 3-room school at Battle Lake and we were there for 4 years. During that time Clyde and Alma were born. Then came 3 years at Silver Lake where a second son, Parker, was born.

In 1902 Mr. Hall took charge of the schools at Motley but neither of us liked it there so the next year we went to Pillager. Here we stayed 6 years and in that time Ruth and Margaret were added to the family. In 1917 Mr. Hall was then retired and drawing the Teacher's pension and we moved north to Kinmount, where Clyde was station agent for the D.W.P. Railroad. (Duluth, Winnepeg, Pacific railroad was part of the Canadian National...ran from Duluth to Fort Frances, Ontario. Listed in 1926 as a two passenger trains a day.) There we saw real pioneering and enjoyed eery bit of it but none of us would care to live it over again.

Alma had married Morris Cromett and was living in Pine River. Mr. Hall, Ruth, Margaret and I (Jessie Maud Smith-Hall) stayed in Kinmount all summer and in the fall we decided to put the insurance money into 40 acres on the edge of Ericsburg. We moved up there and lived in a 2-room shack while we built a house on the corner of "our forty". Then followed 10 years of ups and downs, mostly downs. The insurance had decreased from \$100 a quarter to \$35; work was scarce and both of the boys were idle much of the time. Mr. Hall spent his time clearing the land and getting up wood. I cooked in the hotels, sewed and did a lot of nursing - anything to help earn of living. I went to Duluth one summer and stayed a month on a maternity case. The next winter I went to Cloquet to nurse Mr. Hall's sister, Jennie Gellerman, and was with her until she died in June.

Mr. Hall was taken sick in March and died the next September.

More About HERBERT HENRY HALL:

Cause of Death: Lung cancer so bad it broke his collar bone.

Notes for CLYDE AMOS HALL:

Clyde had no children but was married twice.

In 1918, Clyde was transferred to Ericsburg. In June, Parker enlisted for the war and was sent to Jefferson Barracks, MD, and from there to North Carolina, and in October he was "sent across". Clyde went to International Falls to enlist and was bitterly disappointed because they wouldn't take him. They said they needed him here in the railroad and transportation work worse than they needed him for bullet fodder in France.

Early that summer Clyde went to work as billing clerk at the M.D.W. depot Mpls-

Detroit-Winnipeg) in International Falls. He bought an old Model T and drove back to his work. But the next year they began reconstructing the road and it became impassible, so on Armistice Day, 1917, we moved to International Falls. Margaret was in her second year of training for nursing at the Northern Hospital and she was so glad to have us in town where she could come home on her hours off.

Clyde was the Depot Agent for many years in Big Falls, MN.

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Mr. Henry Hall (Clyde's father) was taken sick in March, 1927 and died the next September, 1927. We lived 4 years in a small cottage on 9th Street and then came the depression. Clyde lost his job in January but had money enough to take care of himself. We gave up the house and I went to Virginia to live with Margaret, who was then city nurse. The next year I spent with the different children. Clyde was called back to work May 25th and shortly after he married and went to live out at Crystal Beach, driving in to his work every day.

Clyde Hall wrote a family newsletter called the "Weakly Astonisher". Pat Quinn has 4 copies of it. Clyde was trying to get genealogy info and pass on family stories - let's keep it up!!

Bill Crommet wrote in 6/1998:

I knew him when I was a young man. I was probably 12 - 14 when I last saw him. He had a gravelly voice and was full of fun and stories as you can garner from his "Weakly Astonisher".

Big Falls, MN named a building "Clyde Hall".

Per Smith Family Register - from Dorothy Cromett-Whit: died in Little Fork Hospital of lung cancer - oct. 27, 1960.

Clyde Hall has 2 headstones on his gravesite in Big Falls, MN. The first headstone was placed there by the Crommets and other relatives. When they visited the gravesite another year, Clyde's 2nd wife had placed a new headstone at the top of his grave and moved theirs to the foot of the grave.

From the Project by Kathryn E. Swanson (born 12/24/1912 in Minot) daughter of Elsie E. Smith (who was daughter of John Amos Smith and Sarah Bogenrief-Smith):

A hodgepodge of anecdotes...mostly those told by Elsie when she was in the mood and I had sense enough to take notes. If I take time to put them in order, they will never get done so here goes. Many of them are repetitious and I can only hope I can catch those.

Elsie was very proud of her musical ear. John Amos was told by a traveling entertainer that he should be his quartet on the road. That was Jess, Elsie, LaMonte, and Charlie. Their 4 part harmony was entirely by ear.

Elsie and Jess had a very close relationship, being 2 years apart, with Jess and her petite build and Elsie tall for her age. They were, from their own accounts, more like hoydenish twins. The 'old Doc' told them once that if they didn't quit eating everything they found, he would hang them by the thumbs but it never deterred them from wandering in the swamp and tasting. Another time he said, "You tell your mother to make you some hats (Grandma was a milliner) and you wear them. You look like Indians. Charlie and Monte spent a lot of time with the Chippewa Indians, much to their Dad's disgust. The guys were responsible for herding cattle near what is now Detroit Lakes, but they were prone to take the hoydens with them and sneak off, leaving the girls in charge until Grandpa investigated and then the girls had to stay home. Both Mom and Aunt Jess told me this and remembered it more as a punishment to them! Does this sound like your regal dignified Grandmother? One of her former pupils told me that she was the most graceful skater that he ever saw. How come she produced so many klutzy spastics as far as athletics!!?

The Detroit School was a 2 story with the high school upstairs. Oldest sister finished high school about 1875. (Doesn't make sense--would make Carrie only 14, but that was in my notes). Slates were used. Alma excelled in Latin. They advanced readerwise. When they went to Fergus Falls in 1885--Mom was 13--they no longer used slates and they were tested to place them in grades. An arrogant teacher gave her her exam and she didn't pass but......(missing few words her)...good thing because she went ahead with good marks. (She was always proud of her schooling, but later on I asked her why she was 21 before she finished high school and she just didn't know. She wasn't put back, as such; she didn't remember missing school during a move or her mother's death. She told of Jess as being way ahead tho' only 2 years older. In High School cousin Ivy, cousin Bess, and Elsie seemed to be a solid threesome. Ivy was spoken of as a guick study and went on to be a nurse and on further to be a doctor. She married a Dr. Titzell. They had 5 children. I have pictures of them. This marriage ended in a divorce. (Boy! Was Ivy ahead of her day!!) Maybe there are some of this family in Chicago yet. Ivy was also a linguist. She read it--talked it. One member of Mom's graduating class, a boy smarter than a whip, was 16 or 17 when he graduated. Mom started high school at 17 (so...what went on at Detroit to give her such a late start? She certainly had no reading problems. I have one of her report cards--I hope--on which she got a 65 1/2 --- yes 1/2 -- in something, but that was passing. (I passed several of my state's exams with 65s and 70s and never felt disgraced. There was nothing unusual for kids to take the state's exams over for one or two years, if they hadn't dropped out by then. So what else is new? At least the high school teachers didn't have to spoon feed them for 4 years and then let them go out with a blank diploma. Oh yes we had high school graduates then that couldn't spell, couldn't figger, couldn't write a legible hand (example--me), and murdered the King's english. While teaching my last years, I noticed often that the parents that yelled, "You don't teach phonics" or "You need to go back to the basics", were the ones that were quite capable of sending misspelled, unpunctuated, uncapitalized, ungrammatical notes. Down, Huddleson, Down off your soapbox!)

Elsie though she was 6 or 7 and was reading in the first or second reader. She remembered that any girl that had a pretty bottle as a water holder for slate cleaner was envied by all. The boys didn't care. Spit and a shirt sleeve sufficed. She also remembered her most embarrassing moment -- when she read Belle as belly and the class laughed at her. McGuffy Readers were the readers.

Stout character Elsie had her nerves too. She often told of finishing a summer term of teaching and being thin and having a pain in her tummy. She went to visit Jess and while there she spotted a chunk of Milk of Magnesia on the shelf. She chewed off a piece and got immediate relief from her pain, so she would nibble on it often after that until voila! No more problem. (She also didn't go back to that school.) She had first noticed the pain on Memorial Day when she had gone most of the day without eating and then filled up on hot bread!!!

In the late 1930s arthritis started plaguing her so she would take a few drops of wintergreen oil on a teaspoon of sugar and her aches would go. I used it too and thought it helped, but the drug store attendants were aghast when I told them what I wanted it for. Said it was a poison -- I'd have to have a prescription. Dr. Breslich said it was an old remedy of the Greeks but we had better things now. Hum! Cortisone, aspirin, Darvon?? With their side effects??

You kids all probably know the story of Gram and "Hot Hands Ole". He was at the height of his popularity as a healer of all when we moved to Minot in 1944 and as he lived and worked in our block, Mom swore me to secrecy and went to see if he could help her. (Secrecy to Edith, that is). She came back and was very quiet, but finally burst out, "Everyone says you feel something as soon as he puts his hands on you. All I felt was disgust!"

Back to her teaching days.

She had them change the position of the stove in her primary room - 4 grades - because the kids were having too much fun behind it. Early blackboards were lampblack mixed with plaster. When you erased it, the black flew and you were as black as a nigger (her word, not mine) by night. Then they got to covering it with liquid black. Not all country schools had maps.

Her first school was in a Finnish community. The kids brought what looked like raw fish to eat every day. She said it may have been processed.

Water supply - 1/2 mile down the road. Pulled up by bucket from open well. Birds thick, lying around the canopy. Stove - rural school - big round barrel like affair, flat on top, middle of room towards the back. Patrons hauled in wood. She was brought burned over wood by a would-be-but rejected-suitor, so she'd get her 'lily white hands' dirty.

Not many books - no shelves needed. Brought books from home. You used what they brought. Punishment - kept after school - mothers approved. Only once she grabbed a switch off a tree in the yard and lambasted a big lout, but always regretted it because

'there must have been a better way'. (With her regal queenlike posture, that boded no good, I doubt if discipline was a problem.)

She remembered her daily program as something like this: Reading, Arithmetic, Spelling in A.M. Geography, Writing-Spencerian Copybooks--History, Physiology in P.M.

Games: Button Button. Songs they sang: "It wasn't too long after the civil war, you know"; "Marching through Georgia"; "Tramp, Tramp, Tramp, Tramp, The boys Are Marching"; "Awake, Awake, Ye Dreamers: Billy Boy, Soldier, Soldier, Will You Marry Me; Up on the House Top; Jingle Bells; Whippo'will. (Kathryn asks: So how come we were singing the same songs in the 1920s after the World War?)

In their Smith Quartet, it was mostly Negro spirituals and Irish songs, such as: Myself and Barney Casey; Went on a Bit of a Spree. Those were the days of minstrels and vaudeville.

Teaching years:

3 months at Long Lake, 5 months at Butler, 3 months at Long Lake again. These were short terms in the fall and spring. In 1893 she went to New York Mills where she taught 3 years. That's where she met Dad who had a meat shop there.

Entertainment: Spelldowns --- great! Elsie Dinsmore books available at the Methodist library. Ralph Conners books --- quote from Herb Hall (Aunt Jess' husband), "My children can read Conners books any time!" Dime Novels. Said Mom, "They were good clean, war and spy stories -- too clean I guess". John Amos caught them reading this 'trash' under the counter in his store and a long lecture ensued.

One day when she was in her 80s and I was home for lunch, she started to recite a poem she had learned in school. It wouldn't come and she scared me half to death because she struggled so and it seemed so urgent that she get it out. I finally got her side-tracked but when I got home, she was ready for me and I copied it down. Here it is. A version of it popped up in the Reader's Digest Yellow Songbook. I like hers best.

A fox came forth one still clear night and prayed for the moon to give him light, For he'd a long journey to take that night Before he'd reach his den-o.

First he came to the farmer's yard; The duck and the geese were all alarmed. Said he, "I'll have one of you this night Before I reach my den-o.

So he took the old duck by the neck Gave her a heave across his back; And the old black duck cried, "Quack! Quack! Quack! As her legs came dangling down-o.

Old Mother Squibble Squabble hopped out of bed; Out of the window she popped her head, "Run, John, run, the goose is dead! And the fox is through the town-o.

Cousin John ran to the top of the hill. He blew his horn both loud and shrill. The fox ran down to the old gray mill, And he hear the sound of the hound-o.

At last he came to the fox's den; There sat the young ones, nine or ten. The fox and his wife they ate the meat And the young ones picked the bones-o.

Training and materials for teaching: Visited a school at Battle Lake 1/2 day to observe. The teacher used the vowels with the consonants: s-s-s-snake. Didn't teach the alphabet as such. (Kathryn says: We get the impression from old stories that the alphabet was the first thing they taught but I wasn't taught it at school. We started with a picture of a cat saying f-f-f-f and the stimulating !!!!The sentences underneath were: I have a fan. A fan I have. Yet I well remember Keith complaining about 1937 that Larry wasn't being taught the alphabet!!! I'll warrant that he had his formal first grade teaching confused with our pre-school.

Back to Mom's experience:

Big schools - 2 or 3 minutes for each lesson. (Kathryn says: Now I go back to Eva Covell telling me about her classes about 1919 and telling about her 5 minute classes. By the 30s, when I started with our magazines, course of study, teachers institutes, monthly directives from the County Superintendent, we were bombarded with the "correlation of grades" such as teaching certain aspects of geography, history, language, on alternate years or combining 2 or 3 grades in language activities and even daring to put a slow 6th reader with a fast 5th reader!!! As I've always said -- there wasn't much progress form Mom's day to the 30s and then along came Leila Ewen to pull the good ideas together and teach them to teachers. At least in North Dakota.)

Tests - written tests aimed at passing state tests in upper grades.

Training - summer schools at Fergus Falls -- 4 weeks.

Materials - Some commercial charts with pictures and printing.

Type of students. A lot of Finns with no english vocabulary. One knew 'fence' and she built on that. Another little not quite 5 year old went to the board and quickly wrote 1,2,3,4,5 and that was her starting point.

Mom was a few days short of 96 and she never had time to get old. She was too busy looking after us!!! All of them were mentally alert until the end or at least until near it. I'm

positive that the only reason that Mom disoriented was because her mind couldn't accept the indignities of her failing body. With a permanent and a new dress, she'd perk right up. I never saw her slump in her wheel chair until the night before she died and she got sick while I was feeding her. That's how I knew she was sick, tho' the nurse wouldn't believe me.

Remember at 80 when she said, "I go up these steps like an old woman?" and how she took care of you 3 youngest while you were getting over the mumps and had Alma and me to care for while we were both sick with them, plus all the dishes, washing, cooking, etc? She was 77 or 78 then.

Also the Yoo-hoos they used in the blizzard were quite a thing. The men had to be quite far away that they couldn't hear the call to meals. Now you know where I got my foghorn. Also we never owned an alarm clock. Mother had one built inside her and I never knew it to fail. Mom was not one for meeting the public. Entertaining was work. No spontaneous coffee parties for her. Visiting and being visited was the time to put the best foot forward. As Dad liked company, she was often made extra work to put a big meal on the table. As so many pioneer women did, she tried to keep up the niceties. A table cloth was always used even though dinner had to wait until she ironed one. The table was set 3 meals a day. The only informal snacking was bread or crackers and milk at bedtime.

That was one of the popular treats in our family too. When anyone was fortunate enough to have the 15 or 25 cents to go to a show, they shared afterward. Edith would come home from Normal about once a month and she usually had one to tell. I don't remember Avis doing this, but I doubt if she had enough spending money to attend very many. She put Edith through and I suspect she slipped here a little more spending money. Dad never would go to the silent movies but the rest of us thought they were the greatest treat ever. Saturday nights at Granville was the farmers' social night. We took in the cream and eggs, went to the show, found our pals, and wandered up and down the street while our parents bought groceries, keeping the poor storekeepers open until 1 PM or so. The men stood around all evening exchanging news, politics, or getting drunk such as they were inclined. The back alley bootleggers had profitable nights. Dad wouldn't go to the movies. However, he did go to Snow White about the first of the Disney films. He was hooked and was as willing to go as the rest of us, but the silents hadn't been his thing. He certainly never begrudged our enjoyment. He liked the Chautaugua but they soon degenerated from bringing culture to the 'sticks' to taking money out of the community with no return value. He was always a supporter of the Air, but Mom wasn't. Keith and I were bribed to stay home with plates of fudge and after he was included, I always looked forward to the fudge treat but once I got my taste of the fun of the Fair, Mom stayed home alone. Betcha it was her feet that made her such a poor sport! The fudge, by the way, was her panacea for all childhood disappointments. But this was supposed to be about the Huddleson Family.

From the Saga by Jessie Maud Smith-Hall:

The Northern Pacific Railroad was not in the process of being constructed and had reached Detroit, now known as Detroit Lakes. Fuller Brothers must have had a penchant for following the Frontier with their business, for when I was 4 years old and sister Elsie had been added to the family, we went to Detroit in a coach attached to a freight train, and were the first passengers to be carried over the line.

Sister Elsie had a very find alto voice while I (Jessie Maud Smith-Hall) sang soprano and many were the duets we sang, both at school and in the church entertainments. I shall never forget the night we sang "Golden Slippers". Mr. Brooks was announcing the program and came and asked me the name of our selection. Instead of telling him, I showed him the sheet music I held in my hand. It was pretty well covered with advertising and he evidently was not much acquainted with sheet music but you can imagine our horror when he announced it as "The tune the old cow died on". That really was printed across the top of the sheet in connection with some other song and he failed to note the "Golden Slippers" in large letters across the middle.

Aunt Jess would work real hard to learn a new piece and then to her disgust, Elsie would sit down and play it by ear with no lessons. She envied her sister Elsie's talent, but then Elsie always envied her her music lessons!

Elsie was one of the first five to graduate from Fergus Falls, MN High School in 1893. After teaching several 3-4 month term schools, she was hired to teach the primary grades at New York Mills, MN. There she met A.V. Swanson and they were married at Wadena. MN.

Elsie's graduation gown is in the Fergus Falls museum.

Elsie could handle horses but she was never really a farm woman at heart and homestead life wasn't easy. When she was 90 years old she said, "I suppose it was a rough life, if you stopped to think about it, but I don't think it hurt me any. I guess our farm was well equipped as any at that time." They got their wash water out of sloughs near their farm, driving out over the fields with a horse and wagon, using barrels to haul water. A mile and a half away in a coulee was a spring where they secured their drinking water. One stove served as both the heating and cooking units. As so many pioneer mothers did, Elsie tried hard to maintain the niceties of family life. No bare table to her. She might make the family wait for a meal while a table cloth was ironed, but a table cloth was used!

Obituary of Mrs. Swanson - died of bronchopneumonia, bilateral (40 hrs) but had arteriosclerosis with senility for 5 years.

The funeral for Mrs. Elsie E. Swanson, 95, longtime Minot area resident who died Thursday at a Minot nursing home, will be Monday at 2 in the Memorial Chapel of First

Presbyterian Church.

Rev. William Puls will officiate and burial will be in the spring in Rosehill Memorial Park.

Mrs. Swanson, the former Elsie Smith, was born Feb. 23, 1872 at Clearwater, MN. She taught school for 5 years in New York Mills, MN area. In 1897 she married A.V. Swanson in Minnesota.

In 1901 they homesteaded in McKinley Township, Ward County, 6 miles NE of Minot. In 1906 they moved into Minot, and in 1915 moved to a farm east of Granville. Mr. Swanson died Feb. 1, 1941. Mrs. Swanson and her family continued to live on the farm until 1944 they moved to Minot. She lived with a daughter, Mrs. Dale (Kathryn) Huddleson. Minot.

Survivors include 3 daughters: Mrs. Huddleson and Mrs. C.V. (Avis) Barkus, and Edith Swanson, both of Jamestown. One son, Keith R. Of Central Valley, CA, 16 grandchildren and 23 great-grandchildren.

Notes for Albert Victor Swanson: Albert Victor Swanson (married to Elsie Smith 6/30/1897 in Wadena, MN)

While working in the Fargo, ND area, he drove in a blizzard to cast his first vote on his birthday in 1891. In 1894 he started a meat market in New York Mills, MN, where he and Elsie resided. In 1899 he went to North Dakota where he homesteaded in McKinley Township, Ward Cty, but it was probably in the fall of 1900 that Elsie, and their baby daughter, traveled by passenger train to live on the homestead.

From the Project by Kathryn E. Swanson (born 12/24/1912 in Minot) daughter of Elsie E. Smith (who was daughter of John Amos Smith and Sarah Bogenrief-Smith):

The folks homesteaded 2 miles north of Gavin Yards in 1901. They moved to Minot in 1905 where they build a new home, but Dad was dabbling in real estate and they made 2 or 3 moves after this before they moved to 1 mile North of Riga where Dad controlled many quarters of hay and pasture land through keeping up delinquent taxes, renting by managing land for out-of-state owners and getting some of it free for his own use. On paper he owned about 3 quarters, but I'm sure he never made full payments and lost the

property about 1927, as did so many. It was the way of life. I can visualize at least 7 other guarters and some odd 40s that I criss-crossed many times with the hay rake and mower from the age of 12 on. In 1926 Dad bought the elevator at Riga and bought grain to ship. He lost heavily on that but made good money on sweet clover seed, but the banks caught him in 1925 and he never fully recovered financially from that and had nothing to fall back on in 1929. He was not alone. He was always dabbling in politics and did practical veterinary work. It wasn't until the epidemic of encephalitis in the 30s that he was convinced of the true value of vaccination. He opposed smallpox vaccination for us kids even though diphtheria vaccine had saved all but Clarabelle in 1904 and Aunt Ede almost died of it when she insisted that Mom and Dad and the kids use the vaccine when they didn't have enough to go around. He really was a whiz with sick horses and cows, but nobody who was educated to the fact that an animal can't be marked before birth (smarty me) could convince him that it was so. Anyway, by 1936 he was struggling to make a living by milking cows, trucking livestock, pasturing a few stock from the Surrey territory--plain hard manual labor. He had spent the years before that on the go, leaving the boys to milk cows, haul hay, etc. Milking shorthorns - Dad's prize registered cow never gave enough milk to her calf. Nor were any of her heifers milk producers.

Homestead days. Built 8x10 shack. 1/2 on Dad's claim and 1/2 on Aunt Ede's. Built a sod barn. (Picture) A.V. filed on homestead 1901. Oscar and family came to their claim one mile west when the A.V.s and Aunt Ede and kids came. (Kathryn says: Edward Swanson was with his dad, Uncle Ed, when he came out that summer to prove up on a claim next to Oscar's. - That was a surprise to me. - They just stayed long enough to establish their claim and sell. Had no intention of living there.) (Aunt Ede and kids lived there long enough to establish, 'prove up' on hers and then moved to Minot where she built a house on Valley Street and put all 3 kids through high supporting herself with dressmaking and nursing. Dad used his political pull to get her the job as matron of the County Hospital before it was taken over and renamed St. Joe by the Catholics. Avis was born in Minnesota. Afton and Clarabelle on Homestead, Edith, Keith and Kathryn in Minot. They lived on Valley Street Belyea (3rd Street) Main Street and in Red House (close to Valker's old Green House, now parkway trailer park).

While on the homestead, Dad had to go to St. Paul. They were low on coal so he told Ralph (17) and LaMonte (15) to go to Burlington to get some. As soon as he left, the air changed and Aunt was weatherwise enough to sense danger and wouldn't let them go (14 miles) and had them haul in as much flax straw as possible. A blizzard struck in the afternoon and they twisted and burned straw for its 3 day duration. On the 3rd day, Ralph insisted on going to see to the stock, so with the aid of a clothesline, they made it to the barn. During their struggle, there and back, Mom and Aunt would take turns going to the door and "Yoo-hooing" as a guide to them. The air was so breathtaking that they had to take turns. They survived and their story is nothing unusual for the time, but Mom always had a horror of blizzards and rightly so. When the Anderson kids started home from our school in 1919, Mom walked the floor in empathy with Mrs. Anderson, knowing the agony she was going through. Their buggy had tipped over just a few rods from the school and the kids had a fence to follow back to Herbranson's close to the school. I was only 7, but I was well aware of our danger going only a little over a half mile across

the field to our home. The horses wouldn't face the storm and Dad had to fight them every inch of the way. Now you know why mother worried about me on cloudy days when I struck off for McKinley 2 blocks away. With her dim eyesight, it spelled danger to her baby.

Dad (Albert V. Swanson) must have known Grandfather Amos because he said once that Afton was just like him---always blowing and not knowing what he was talking about. But I also remember Mom saying that Grandpa always objected to all the kids' marriages and would have probably said she was marrying a green Swede SO - it must have been about 1896 before the folks came to ND in the Turtle, MT area and homesteaded. They soon moved on from there to Simpson, MT on the Canadian border - 40 miles from Havre - where they lived a few years before Uncle Monte moved on to Seattle where he was a policeman until retirement.

A little space for Dad. He was the organizer. Got our first mail route out from Denbigh and later a daily one from Granville. Had the only telephone in the area for years. Was Precinct Committee Commissioner in Ward County in homestead days. Worked hard for Gov. Shaffer's campaign with a strong motive, but he was passed over for the Game Warden job he had been promised. Was offered a new Ford in the 1930s to campaign for Frazier, but refused it because he didn't like the cut of the jibe of 'that crowd'. Handy in carpentry and blacksmithing. Understood good farming but was apt to specialize in non-paying enterprises such as Plymouth Rock Chickens, Purebred Turkeys, Milking.......

More of my (Kathryn's) notes:

Dad was County Commissioner. That's where he got his clout for Aunt's job.

He became a county commissioner in 1903, and it was he who suggested the name Afton when that township was organized. He also insisted they use the services of the newly established State Board to audit their books. Albert also served on the first Fair board and helped organize the Minot Fair when it was first held on South Hill.

In 1906, Albert sold out and they moved to Minot to make a life a little easier for Elsie. He was involved in some real estate moves, played in politics, and continued trading, selling and breeding horses until the city fathers put the pressure on him to move out of city limts.

In 1915 they moved to Riga, McHenry County, where he bought a ranch north of town for his horse raising activities. He worked for the Independent Voters Assn versus the Nonpartisan League, which was a North Dakota split of the Republican Party. Albert wrote prolifically in verse, much of it about North Dakota, politics and the depression. Some of these were published in the Granville Herald. After struggling through the ups and downs from 1915 to 1940, the economy began to get better and he again became politically active, but was stricken with cancer and died at his home in Riga.

After her husband died, Elsie made her home with her children, the Huddlesons, until her

death. Both are buried at Rose Hill Cemetery, at Minot, ND.

Obituary: A.V. Swanson Died at Riga

Prominent in Political and Civic Activities in McHenry and Ward Counties Albert A. Swanson, aged 70 years, prominent farmer and stockraiser of Riga, died at his home on Thursday, February 20, after an illness of 2 months.

Mr. Swanson was born at Afton, MN, Nov. 6, 1870. He came to Ward County in 1898 and filed on a homestead NE of Minot, ND where he lived until 1906, when he moved to that city. The family lived there for about 9 years then moved to the Riga vicinity, where they engaged in farming and stockraising.

Mr. Swanson served as County Commissioner in Ward County for 2 terms, beginning in 1905. In the early days he was secretary of the Ward County Fair. For a number of years he was chairman of the McHenry County Republican central committee, and during his residence at Riga, held various township offices.

Funeral services were held at Minot, ND Saturday, Nov. 22, Rev. Frank G. Beardsley, pastor of the First Congregational Church of Minot, conducting the services. Burial was made in Rosehill Cemetery in Minot.

Surviving besides his widow are 2 sons and 3 daughters: Afton of Granville and Keith of Redding, CA; Mrs. C.V. Barkus of Jamestown, Miss Edith Swanson, who is a nurse in Alaska, and Mrs. Dale Huddleson of Granville, also a sister, Mrs. George Gaslin of Wadena, MN and 9 grandchildren.

Notes for ANTON 'TONY' SCHRITZ:

Luxembourg is the Grand Duchy between France and Germany which was invaded by Hitler's blitzkrieg spring 1939.

On Sept. 20, 1913, Rev. John Schritz brought Anton (then 18 yrs old) to USA on the Red Star Line ship called the Lapland from Antwerp to New York (calling on Dover). Anton's mother gave him a watch and some money and let him go. Anton stayed in Avon, Ohio with his uncle, Dominic Schritz. Anton was there one year to help out on 60 acre farm and to learn english. Dominic's daughter Connie remembers giggling at Anton's pronunciation - kanife for knife. He was malnourished - had a lot of nose bleeds - needed more protein. Used to eat raw eggs.

Uncle John then brought Anton to Wheaton, Dumont, Kent and Abercrombie and Anton worked there.

He was in Underberg or Bellmore then went to Canada to homestead. Canadian police grabbed Anton and put him in jail (see article below).

Worked for Hedloft on Canadian Line. Met Amy Smith in a couple of years and met John. Then to Abercrombie. Father John went between Abercrombie & Kent.

Anton Schritz applied for homestead in Alberta Canada:

When Tony was 22, he was arrested in Saskatchewan because the police officer couldn't translate his passport and birth certificate which A. Schritz, a native of Luxemburg, carried in his pocket while in the country at Sage Creek, a district located close to the Saskatchewan line and U.S. Tony was taken to Calgary and then turned over to the First Depot Battalion. He was finally released - charged with not carrying requisite proof of his exception under Class 1 of the Military Service Act in Canada - but was told to get his passport and birth certificate made in English.

This is to certify that A. Schritz German was arrested on the 18th day of July 1918 by the Calgary City Police charged under Order in Council 1013 was brought before the Magistrate and charges dismissed against him. (written 7/20/1918)

NOTE: Per his son John Schritz, Anton never served - got out because of farming and then moved to Minnesota.

Tony worked on Femco Farms (owned by Frederick E. Murphy) with mailing address of Kent, MN. Have photo postcard of a Percheron horse on which Mr. Murphy wrote that this champion horse from France would cost \$12,000, but guessd he wouldn' buy it as Tony would have to build another barn.

Dec 1913 Tony received a postcard addressed to Dumont, MN written in german from his friend Mahowald who lived at Box 131 new Market, MN.

Tony lived in Dumont, MN in Sept. 1915. His friend (Michael Frisch) wrote him a postcard saying hi, and supposed that Tony was still working at Michael's brother's place.

1922 - Anton's daughter Mary was first girl born in Femko Farms (Murphy's). Mary Catherine came back Josephine Catherine.

August 16, 1922 Rev. John A. Schritz wrote Anton at Kent, MN from Strandbaden-Wessersdort - probably Luxembourg and sent greetings to Tony's wife and little girl.

Feb 26, 1926 Fr. John Schritz wrote Anton at Kent, Wilkin County, MN sending greetings from Kansas City, MO.

The Mpls Threshing Machine Co. 3/29/1932 released Chattel Mortgage 179084 21-248 taken out 3/17/1928 by Tony Schritz and Guy Smith of Rothsay, MN.

Per John A. Schritz, Tony paid Guy \$500 cash and \$500 IOU in 1936 or so for his share of the land/eqt. The bank would not loan Tony \$1,000 at that time. Guy later moved to California.

Tony took trip to Luxembourg (first since he left) in November 1957. His wife, Amy, and daughter (Marge) went with him.

Tony used to teach us how to spell Schritz the Luxembourg way. The only german words we learned were "Dumkopf, Rumfas, and Schizidit" - which I don't think we want translated. It was a real treat to go to town with Grandpa - or take a load of grain to the elevator in Rothsay or Lawndale. He liked to eat hard sausage and usually had a sausage roll along.

Per letter from Jeanette Schritz to her sister, Violet Edwards, John bought a quarter of land from Anton Schritz for \$8,000 around Nov. 1960. Phillip Schritz is renting 3 quarters and Anton is going to draw Social Security as Ruth was still a dependent he gets about \$225 a month.

Tony and Amy moved to Mesa, Arizona after retiring. They lived at 1032 E. Jarvis in December 1968. (see photo).

Kathryn was 2 1/2 years of age when the family moved from Minot to Riga. She attended the Model High School at the college the first 2 years it was organized. She attended Minot State and taught eight years in McHenry County and 2 yeras in Renville County before moving to Minot. She taught 19 years at McKinley School in Minot. Kathryn was one of the many who taught with a 2 year "standard", continuing to take courses towards her B.S. In 1963 she got her degee in elementary education, 9 months after becoming a grandmother. She belonged to the MEA and NDEA. While her children were growing up she was active in PTA, directed the Cherub Choir at the First Presbyterian Church, was a Cub Scout den mother, and held many positions in teh Girl Scout program. She started out with her oldest daugher's troop in 1952, continued with

the other two girls, and was thoroughly hooked. She is still a registered Scout, helping out as a consultant. Not many people get a "35 year pin", especially when they start our as an adult!

In 1975 she wrote a long family history called "The Project". From the Project by Kathryn E. Swanson (born 12/24/1912 in Minot) daughter of Elsie E. Smith (who was daughter of John Amos Smith and Sarah Bogenrief-Smith):

Also the Yoo-hoos they used in the blizzard were guite a thing. The men had to be guite far away that they couldn't hear the call to meals. Now you know where I got my foghorn. Also we never owned an alarm clock. Mother had one built inside her and I never knew it to fail. Mom was not one for meeting the public. Entertaining was work. No spontaneous coffee parties for her. Visiting and being visited was the time to put the best foot forward. As Dad liked company, she was often made extra work to put a big meal on the table. As so many pioneer women did, she tried to keep up the niceties. A table cloth was always used even though dinner had to wait until she ironed one. The table was set 3 meals a day. The only informal snacking was bread or crackers and milk at bedtime. She guarded our reading habits. In the 1920s the popularly exchanged Xmas gifts were western books: Zane Grey, McRaine, Jackson Gregory, etc. She didn't think I should read them because they were love stories. As I was starved for reading, I would promise to guit reading them when I came to 'that part', but boy could I skim fast!! She tried to guide us to Alger, etc., but the supply was limited. We had the Alcott and Gene Stratton Porter books and they were literally read to pieces. Tess and Tess of the Storm Country were the Catcher of the Rye's of those days, but she read them-and so did I when I was supposed to be cleaning upstairs. But we were taught a form of discrimination in reading and were able to judge the true stories and movie mags as the trash they were then. She loved movies and TV. What would she think of the stuff that's put out now!!!

Dec 1, 1979. On being asked to bring some ethnic food to a tea, I knew I wasn't ready for such, and, as I had been working on this thing and as I was going to make divinity anyway, and as it was for the genealogical society, I came up with this poem. I dressed in red, white, and blue and put on my Indian earrings:

Ay ban mostly Svensk And a leetle Dutch; Scotch Irish and some English; Though of these I can't claim much.

My Grandpap was John Amos Smith; His daddy Smith, John Cooper; Were I to trace them I might find A 'Revolution' trooper.

Among our family legends A Mohawk met the Mayflower,

And, the history books will bear me out, John Smith o'er them had power.

So I brought no ethnic food, But came as Doodle Dandy. I can't compete with foreign food; So here's American candy.

The parents and gate intake pays for the whole program, so we have to work to provide the funds. The team needs to eat, travel, clothes and equipment. We have met several other sets of parents. Some we have known in Little League and Cub Scouts over the years. Jason Henry is still hanging in there and is play on the JV team, so John still has his buddy.

3-2000 (after spending a week at St. George's Island off the coast of Florida in the Gulf of Mexico). Jim and his family go to St. George Island several times a year - great vacation spot. Jim Hargrove's story of their fishing adventure:

How to Kiss a Redfish

If fishing can make people happy, then fishing on the Gulf ought to make a person downright blissful. Maybe that explains why my buddy, Al Baumstark, was staring out a gulfside cottage window early in March, shaking his head and saying, "What a fish, what a day, what a dream!"

The redfish that helped make Al's day a dream probably had not read the flier on Red Drum that is published by the Florida Marine Research Insitute. Under the category, "Size," the flier states: "To 40 inches, 40 pounds on the Gulf Coast; 45 inches, 51 pounds on the Atlantic Coast." Maybe the fish had gotten lost, because it was 45 official inches, nose to tail-fork. Official, according to the markings embossed on the top of Capt. Charlie Wilson's red ice chest that rested in the back of his 22 foot center console fishing boat, and verified by three witnesses who will swear the measurement is accurate.

Al, who is an objective man, claims the fish was 50 inches long to the end of its tail, and that it weighed at least 45 pounds. It should be noted that Al's objectivity might have been slightly tainted after an hour and 20 minutes of playing the fish on 12 pound test monofilament with a spinning reel that screeched as if its bearings had turned to powder after the red made its first long run in the general direction of Apalachicola.

In retrospect, Al probably should have read Vic Dunaway's authoritative comments about redfish BEFORE he tried to catch one. Under Tackle and Bait, the entry in Sport Fish of the Gulf of Mexico plainly states: "Light ocean tackle can come in handy for big fish in strong currents of channels

and passes." Alas, it was not light ocean tackle that Al had used to cast a one inch piece of cut bait dangling from a 1/0 hook into the Gulf just before Capt. Wilson had said, "That's half a day, folks, time for lunch." Indeed it was, but not for us. "Uh," Al glibly responded, "Something that feels like a submarine just took my bait."

"Probably a shark," said the Captain. "You probably should break it off."

"Do you want to see a grown man cry?" Al replied. "Anyway, it has run out all the line. If you motored up to it, we could at least get some of your line back." I hauled in the anchor as the captain started the motor. "You're the boss, but I'll have to tell you about the time Forrest Gump died and went to heaven if you keep me out here much longer!"

Al cranked madly to rewind some line. As we approached the fish, it seemed to be nearing the surface. "If it was a shark, it would have run," said Capt. Wilson, "Maybe a ray or*Oh*my*Gawd*a*bull*red!"

Checking his watch, he noted that AI had already had the fish on for twenty minutes. "Know which way a bull red runs," he asked? "Any which way it wants!" The whine of AI's reel confirmed the statement. "What pound test is this, AI asked. "Twelve," said the skipper. "Don't horse it or you'll never see it again."

For the next hour, we took a redfish tour of Apalachicola Bay that included every hole more than ten feet deep between Sikes Cut and St. Vincent Island. We heard about St.

Peter asking Forrest Gump how many days of the week start with a T, how many seconds there are in a year, and what was God's first name. By the end of the hour, we were all singing, "Andy walks with me, Andy talks with me," but we were all praying the redfish would come up one more time. It finally did, and Capt. Wilson very carefully netted the fish and gently lifted it into the boat so we could take pictures.

"Hey, Al," my wife said as she focused the camera, "If you kiss it, I will take your picture."

I am not sure Capt. Wilson ever saw someone kiss a redfish before, but Al leaned over and kissed that fish right between the eyes. And then Capt. Wilson gently lowered the fish into the Gulf and rocked it like a new grandbaby. It moved its gills, flicked its tail, and disappeared into the water, leaving us with an ice chest full of white trout, a couple of sail cats, some whiting, and one very sore wrist.

So if you want to kiss a bull redfish and turn a day of vacation into a dream of a lifetime, you can try doing what we did. If you are a visitor to the Forgotten Coast, you should find a good guide like Capt. Wilson who has the knowledge of local waters to know when seemingly dead water can come alive. Check the latest issue of CoastLines, or one of the Panhandle newspapers, or a web page like the one that John Spohrer manages. That is how I contacted Capt. Wilson, the man who guided us before we knew we were more interested in catching a dream than landing a bunch of fish.

The average tourist may head off to fish the surf around St. George Island, and may be happy to catch a whiting or catfish every half hour or so. But Capt. Wilson said that his motto is, "If you aren't having fun, don't do it." And in his mind, not getting a bite for five minutes is not considered having fun. His idea of fun is when four people are in a boat and all four have fish on.

Come to think of it, I am not sure why they call it the Forgotten Coast. Every time I close my eyes, I see blue water, white sand beaches, and AI with that redfish-kissing grin of his, and I remember what he said: "What a fish, what a day, what a dream!" The fish is still out there, and if you want to try to catch it so it can be part of your dream, go ahead. Just motor out into the bay until you see a white sand beach a hundred yards away with a bunch of jack pines on it, and the current is strong and cormorants fly overhead. That's the secret spot, the honey hole, the field of dreams. But if you want to be home by lunch, I am sure Capt. Wilson would recommend that you try using some light ocean tackle with maybe 30 pound test.

Childhood memories:

Our farm was located off Hwy 9 (the old grade) in Manston Township, Wilkin County, MN.

We spent a lot of time playing outside, making our own toys, such as corn cob with feathers to throw, bow and arrows from the willow trees and twine, horses (stick with a bit of twine), lots of tents and forts in the trees. We named many of the trees: 3 horses, Marion, Swinging Tree, etc. Also there were two rock piles in the tree grove. We used black tarp to make teepee type forts. We would scrape the floors smooth. We collected cans/bottles/junk from the two junk piles in our tree grove. There also was an old car in the trees that we would sit in and pretend we were driving. I was a firebug - I loved to burn the trash, but also would build brick furnaces in the trees and burn leaves. I finally got scared of fire when Dad took me to burn back some grassy ditches. The wind shifted and we had to drive the old red Massey tractor through a wall of fire. It was so hot it singed my hair (smelt awful). I had more respect for fire after that.

Grandpa Tony Schritz would come over and take us buffalo bone hunting. Actually we probably only found cow bones, but he would tell us they were really buffalo bones. We would find arrowheads and petrified wood pieces. I think he was checking out the fields, but us kids were checking out everything else. Grandpa would have us taste flax and also the green fruit/seeds on the weeds in front of the barn. I have no idea what we were eating, but we liked it.

Saturdays were cleaning, ironing, baking, and mowing. We had to clean our bedrooms and the normal house dusting/vacuuming. Remember the red circular Ureka vacuum with a large bag that we had to empty. We also took turns ironing. The clothes were generally sprinkled with water and frozen in the freezer. Dad had his white Sunday shirts that were not wrinkle free in those days. After ironing your turn, then you could mow the section of lawn you had that week. We tried to rotate jobs. We also had to bake one thing each week for lunches during the week - either several cake pans or a large batch of cookies. Jerry liked peanut butter cookies so we made him bake them himself (otherwise being a boy he didn't have to bake).

Saturday morning TV shows were Fury, My Friend Flicka, Howdy Doody, Hopalong Cassidy, etc. We could catch parts while working sometimes. On Sunday evenings Dad would watch Combat. I believe Bonanza was on then too.

We had 2 large chest freezers in the basement for meat, vegetables and baked goods. I remember once when mom had put up lots of fresh chickens, one package fell behind the freezer and we didn't notice til it had become very "ripe".

Every Sunday we went to early mass. Only once or twice a year would we miss if there was too bad of a blizzard. We generally were close to a half hour early. Most families had their own "pew" that they used every Sunday. Grandma and Grandpa sat in front of us and Ray and Marie sat in front of them.

A lot of Sundays all of the Schritz family would get together at Grandma/Grandpa's farm. We would play softball and the adults would play pinocle and poker. We would all try to

get into Grandpa's hammock or sit on those bumpy red chairs in the outdoor patio/fireplace area. All us grandkids would play hide and seek - I remember under the back porch - had a loose stone that you could hide things in. Grandpa would have everyone taste his wine - sometimes we would get the privilege of sucking the hose to get the wine started. The wine vats were in the dark basement - where the bathroom was. Grandma always had all the Northern bathroom tissue baby pictures pasted on the walls. All the colors - pale yellow, pale blue, peach, etc.

We visited Mary and Jack Gilmore's farm place - only few miles away. Us kids had fun with the animals and making stuff with the clay in the ditches.

I attended Barnesville Catholic School 1st-8th grades. We had 2 grades per room. The rooms had "school house glass block" windows with 2 regular windows for venting. The rooms were surrounded the basketball gymnasium. Each morning the bus would drop us off, we'd go to church where mass was already going on. School lunch was served in the Church basement. Mrs. Kieselbach was the cook - really terrific barbecues but terrible rubber cheese macaroni.

Each month we had hot chocolate and coffee cakes after the First Friday services. We really looked forward to the variety and "choice" we had to make of all the rolls/cakes made by the ladies of the Church Guild.

Teachers I remember were Sr. Marmien (1st grade or so), Sr. Damien (4-6th), and Mr. John Kraft (8th grade). Our first male teacher (besides the priest)!

9th and 10th grade I attended Mount St. Benedict Academy in Crookston, MN. I was an aspirant to be a nun. It was a very good school and met some really nice friends. Sr. Lamberta was my favorite teacher (science) who also took me on special science trips (rafting on the river, collecting specimens) and making the candy for the holidays for all the sisters. She also got me started on raising guppy fish.

11th and 12th grades I went to Barnesville High School. It was a breeze after the Mount. My senior year I didn't even have a study hall because I helped out the office instead. I still very rarely had homework. My worst class was either typing or calculus - funny that I work on a computer for a living now.

The night of graduation I hopped a train for Mpls/St. Paul. My sister Diane just got married and I took over her room in a St. Paul apartment with 3 other girls: one normal, one nympho, and one mega overeater with the worst personal habits ever. What an education! Thanks alot Diane!

I attended the University of Minnesota Institute of Technology. I got my first full fledge "F" in an organic chemistry class there - very demoralizing. Thank heaven we had a lab in the class in which I got an A, so I received a C in the class. I moved from St. Paul (which had a campus bus that brought me over to Mpls) to near the Mpls college campus. I lived in a house with 7 other girls upstairs. We all had different schedules (some worked nights, etc.). I met my first husband, Butch (Francis) Quinn thru one of my

roommates - who's cousin was having a party. Several of us decided to go, and Butch and her cousin picked us up. Butch liked my long blonde hair - we started dating, and got married a year later.

6 months after we were married we moved to Butch's home town, Litchfield, MN. We moved into a small pink (yes pink inside and out) trailer house just outside of Mananah (population 50). We stayed there several years then moved to a house outside of Grove City, MN. We then bought a lot in Mananah and bought a green and white trailer house with green deck. Butch then bought a small garage down the street to work on cars. We lived across from the grocery and beer stores. After a few years, we sold the trailer for a down payment on a house 5 miles outside Litchfield where we lived til we were divorced. I stayed in Litchfield for a year after our divorce, but then moved to Apache Junction, AZ to be near my folks. My boss had died, the company was being sold, job was insecure, and winter was coming. So, in November 1979 I packed up the kids in my little grey w/black stripes AMC Pacer with a 4x6 green trailer behind with all my belongings and headed to Arizona with my sister Mary Sue helping me out. Butch was still living in our Litchfield house when he died in 1980.

The trek to Arizona was a long 3 days - with the trailer tongue breaking in a detour in Dodge City, Kansas. We stopped in Wichita, Kansas and stayed with my old Minnesota neighbors, Willis and Susie Miller. We then drove to Sante Fe, New Mexico to stay with Karen Edwards & Tony. Then on thru the Salt River Canyon in the dark to Apache Junction.

I was hired as Marketing Secretary at Talley Defense Systems and was working by the end of November. I have been with Talley ever since, now in 1998 being a Publication Specialist.

On January 25, 1991 I married Jose A. Oliva in the Little Chapel of Mesa in Mesa, AZ. Rosanne Krull and Brenda Franklin, two of my sisters, were my witnesses. Jamie and Shawn stood up for me. Dad walked me down the aisle. Mom, who was suffering with cancer, was put on an IV that day, so was unable to make it to the wedding. Jan Bancroft had stayed with Mom. We video taped it and after a short reception at my house, Jose and I took the video out to Mom - still in our wedding clothes for her to see. Mom was very happy we stopped by on our special day. Jose and I then went up to Gold Canyon Ranch to stay for our honeymoon night. We had a fireplace, wetbar, and jacuzzi in our room. The view from the Superstition Mountains over Phoenix was spectacular.

In 1992 Jose and I made two trips to Honduras to get his 14 year old son through immigration. After tons of paperwork in the U.S., we found out they wanted all new paperwork in Honduras. Finally, Chepito (Jose's son Jose) was able to come to America. He had only 4 years of schooling - could add some - to less than 10, didn't know how to alphabetize so had hard time using dictionary, never did mazes, puzzles, or dot-to-dot pictures. Everything we take for granted here, Chepito had never seen. He hadn't read any books to speak of, because there was no library and the school had few books in the village on the mountain were he lived with his Grandmother. So he had lots to catch up on - learn english to begin with, then learn our money, customs, personal

habits, and even electricity (which his grandparents didn't have in Honduras), etc. It was a brand new world for him for sure. He did take to the computer and computer games.

Jose and I divorced in 11/94. Jamie got married April, 1998. Shawn bought a home in north Phoenix - near Honeywell where he works in September 1998. Am home with my 3 birds: Red, Max, and Road Kill. Red (El Roho) is a Australian King Parrot - mostly red, with green wings and royal blue tail. Max and Road Kill are two cockatiels that were found outside. Road Kill I picked up off a 4 lane road to work after he got blowed around by 2 semi-trucks. Max landed on the shoulder of a gal at work when she was sitting in her backyard. She had several cats, so called me to get the bird.

In January 1999, after getting diagnosed with cancer and having several small surgeries, I gave the two cockatiels (Max and Road Kill) to a guy at work. He bred them together and had 3 small baby cockatiels.

Email from Patricia Schritz-Quinn to her sister-in-law, Shiela Ham on 2-15-1999:

One chemo down, at least 7 to go.. and not as bad as I expected. If I had had the proper stomach/intestine relief, it would have been not too painful at all. I get a few mild side effects, but for being one of the worst chemos, they give you anti-nausea, etc. first, then the chemo - so I had no nausea at all. It was the 3rd day after before I got any real hard symptoms. - like acid poured in my stomach and intestines. They had mentioned that my membranes would "sluff", but didn't tell me what it would feel like and what to do then. Now I know so next time won't be so bad.

Jamie went with me - I hate needles. She saw that it wasn't bad and that I didn't get sick, so it is helping her cope a bit better. My sister Diane is taking it the worst. I'm going to spend a week with her in March so that she can see that I'm not "dying". She's going thru menopause, etc. and is worrying herself over everything from work to kids to all the family.

Took last CAT scan last Friday....Yea - no more tests for awhile!!!! so now it is only blood test once a week and chemo once every 3 weeks. Not too bad. Radiation should start in about a month, but that is only a few minutes a day and shouldn't cause any more symptoms. So overall, pretty easy over what it was when my Mom went thru it.

Haven't lost my hair yet....but am told with the month perhaps.

Will try to keep in touch. I'm going to make a "family list for cancer updates".....so that I can send to all at one time.

This week, besides a head cold I picked up, I'm almost normal (or as normal as I was in the first place).

Email from Patricia Schritz-Quinn to her sister-in-law, Shiela Ham on 2-23-1999:

My next chemo treatment is this Friday. My bonescan came out negative - so no cancer in my bones. I'll find out Friday how my CAT scan, Heart muga, EKG, etc. results.

My hair I cut short this week....but is falling out real fast - by brush fulls. So I will be in my wig by Monday for the latest I'm sure.

I have been feeling good this week - except a little scalp soreness from the chemo. Overall Terrific! Appetite was back so gained back 5 of the 15 lbs I lost.

So I'm hoping this chemo doesn't have any new side effects, then I'll be able to cope just fine.

Jamie had fun with me picking out wigs. I tried on one that was about shoulder length.....but it was too light a color with bangs and when the lady put it on me, all I saw was LINDA TRIPP - so ripped that one right off. Jamie and I picked out a dark blonde short wig. She gave it a thumbs up.

Not much else new.....will put a bald photo on the internet when all my hair goes...should be interesting.

Letter 12/1999 Pat to relies, friends:

Hi! As I never write.....I'm sending a general letter because I can't remember who I've talked to.

This year has been a bit hectic - diagnosed with Breast cancer in January 1999. I had a lump that popped up in 1 day the size of a hard boiled egg. At first they thought it was an simple abscess, but the biopsy said cancer. Then a week later, another lump popped up by my neck. Scary.

So I had 6 months of Chemo treatments. They were terrible. My veins fell apart right away and I developed hives from some of the chemo - so they put in a Chest Port so the treatments can be put in larger veins. The last batch of chemo they also gave me steroids - and I think the reactions to them was worse than the chemo.

In August I had a modified mastectomy. Surgery takes so long to recoup from - and I've been under the knife 4 times this year now. And that is not counting the abscess tooth I had that they cut into thru the gum.

Now I'm getting 30 radiation treatments. The original cancer site was cut out, but I still have a bit of cancer in the lymph nodes. Hopefully the radiation will kill it off.

So, my head is starting to get almost normal - my brain feels a little short-circuited from the chemo, but is coming back. I'm just tired all the time. I'm taking alot of herbs/vitamins to help my immune system, etc. I've been lucky and only got pleuresy during all

the months of chemo. I never even picked up a cold!!

I lost all my hair in February - and have been wearing a wig since then. My hair has started to grow out now (I finally have eye brows & lashes!). The Chemo pulled all the color out of my hair - turned white. It is now about 1/2" long - mostly white with a bit of black in it. I've always been blonde, so this is something new. I'm hoping to have wearable hair by Christmas.

I've been able to work most of the year. I only had 3 weeks off for my last surgery.

If I never see a doctor or a needle again, I'd be happy. I really enjoyed many of the books I've been reading, but Gilda from Saturday Night Live who died from Ovarian cancer had a real neat audio book - and this was her cancer song:

Gilda Radner's Cancer Song

I am well I am wonderful I am cancer free
No little cancer cell is hiding inside of me
but if some little cancer cell is sneakily holding on
I'll bash and beat its ugly head and smash it til its gone.

That about covers it. I'm still in the cancer bashing mode. Pat

On 7/21/1965 Butch enlisted in the U.S. Army Reserve, Selective Service No. 21-71-45-91. 311th Ord Co.(FS) in Willmar for 26 weeks active duty and a 6 year weekend warrior enlistment.

Married by Fr. Andrew Winczewski; witnesses: Marland R. Myer and Diane Schritz Hartle. Marriage Certificate was issued out of Hennepin County, as both Butch and Pat were living in Minneapolis, MN at the time they got married.

Butch loved mechanical things and loved fast vehicles. He was in numerous auto accidents. For years he carried a picture around of his 1963 Corvette which was totalled in an accident and had to be scooped onto a flatbed truck to haul it away....he walked away from the accident. He was also in a very bad snowmobile accident when his son Shawn was only one year old. He was going at least 80 mph when he hit a pole. His helmet was cracked open.....the snowmobile handlebars fell on top of him, breaking his right arm. He had severe internal injuries. (During surgery, they used about 8 pints of blood - sewed his burst stomach back together, removed approx. 1/3 of his liver which had shattered, and removed his gall bladder that was pulled out of place). His pancreas/spleen were bruised and his open-surfaced liver was oozing, so they pumped water thru his abdomen until the liver sealed. He was hospitalized 11 weeks.

Most of his life he was a heavy equipment operator - mostly in road construction.

Francis Joseph Quinn died in an automobile accident on County Rd #24 outside of Litchfield, MN on October 17, 1980 at 2 AM. The Johnson-Hagglund Funeral Home handled the funeral arrangements.

Butch is buried in the Litchfield, Meeker County, MN in the St. Philip's Catholic Cemetery.

My daughter, Keri, and I went skiing twice in the White Mountains in northern Arizona. We've found it more relaxing to take the bus up there instead of driving on slippery roads ourselves. Jim doesn't enjoy the thrill of sliding downhill on two thin boards at a high rate of speed since he has no control over the number of times he will find himself planted firmly in the snow!

Spring continued to be wet, but was not the fantastic wild flower bloom we had hoped

for. My niece, Jamie, got married in April. It was a fun time visiting with family. We always get in a few games of scrabble. Oh yeah, cribbage is the tradition, too.

Jim and I took a weeks vacation in April and headed up to Northern Arizona and Utah. We drove through and hiked through some gorgeous canyons and countryside. The weather was on our side making for a great trip and photo opportunity (like we need much of an excuse to spend film). We really enjoyed the vast open areas and few people. It is unbelievable the diverse terrain and varied beauty that is just waiting to be explored! Just as we were thinking that we may not see any critters, we ran across a midget faded rattler in a slot canyon. We had read about them and felt fortunate to see one. The erosion of rock has left some very unusual formations. We slithered through tight slot canyons and hiked many miles in bigger canyons to find arches and side canyons that are somewhat hard to find but worth the hunt. Got a few bumps and bruises trying to climb up into one particularly interesting slot canyon where you had to crawl up through holes in the rock to make your way up the canyon. Did not attempt to go down by the same route!

My god-daughter, Bethanie, came from Texas to visit us for 12 days. It was so nice to see her. Wished I could have had more time off to visit. She got to see all her relatives in town.

I had surgery Nov. 24, and got home Thanksgiving evening. I am recovering well. Jim thinks that is so morbid, but he knows I was determined to understand what it was that was causing me so much grief

for so long. Anyway, my "very sick" sister had the photo on the internet to other sisters that evening. Knowing the gene pool I come from explains a lot. We got a lot of comments and laughs over that one.(my apologies to the squeamish) I have 6 weeks off work over the holidays-did I time that right?

Greg (Jim's son), Keri and Jason all are doing well and continue to move around making a mess of the address book. It is nice to see them finding their career paths and settling down. All three are in their twenties. We can't be that old!!!!

Jim and I are at the same jobs. Jim likes working closer to home and doing similar type printing work that he has always done. The evening shifts is working out well. I am still on the same home care case for the past 9 years. Chuckie is 19 years old and doing well for his condition. He is quadraplegic and unable to speak, but has quite the ability to express himself with facial and vocal expressions. He is such a joy to care for because he is such a happy guy. His mental capacity is limited, but he enjoys being around people and in the center of the attention. I was doing some occasional shifts on other cases to get some change and varied experiences.

That about sums up our past year. We hope you are doing well, and enjoying the holiday season. We wish you the best in the new year.

1-10-2000 Email from Rosanne:

Had the scope done on both ends this a.m.----sorry no photos! Use your demented imaginations for the visual on this one. I don't know what they found so interesting that I need to go through this every few years, guess our gene pool need some chlorine bleach. No polyps, had a couple diverticuli (without inflammation), and slight hiatal hernia.

Am not sure what the difficulty swallowing is from, but did dilate the throat to try to remedy that. I don't remember a thing, so this is info via Jim's conversation with the Dr. I'll talk to Dr. later this week.

Feb 12, 2000 email from Rosanne - re: thyroid tests:

Benign, and not autoimmune. I have two spots that are overactive, and thyroid is possibly going to go berserk at some point (levels have been normal up to now). Have started thyroid replacement to prevent thyroid from growing larger and be stuck with a fat neck for life---too bad it can't prevent a

double chin,too! Noone can tell me why I'm having problems swallowing and choking. That's what I went in for originally!! :)

As of October 9, 1998 all burn areas have healed over, so no more whirlpool treatments. Doctors say within the year there should be no scars, except on her stomach area where she had 3rd degree burns.

Jan. 11, 2000 email from Brenda:

Yesterday we got 4-6 inches of snow (hard to tell when it blows around). Anyway, it got pretty nasty out late in the day with the high winds from the North and the continuous snow. They pulled the snow plows off the roads and advised no travel. Well, as timing goes, the kitty cat has the worst.

She hadn't been home for nearly 40 hours, which is odd given how much she loves her food and water......and as luck would have it, I was the one who let the cat out on Sunday morning and wouldn't get out of the warm bed when the cat came to the door to come in again. So if there is blame to lay, it lay with me. (Another attempt to get rid of the cat!!!)

Now, don't misunderstand, we have had several LOST CAT episodes, but this one seemed especially odd since she didn't come when we called. After one very sleepless night (we checked for the cat nearly every half hour and waited up until midnight for her to come home) Jerry then went over to the farmhouse to see if he could find the cat. He could hear her cry, but that was all so he knew she wanted out and wasn't just pouting. So then he started to look "under" the house, and he finally got a

glimpse of her as she continued to cry, like she was trapped or just plain too fat to get out the hole she got into.

At 9:00 PM, he could no longer stand it, and he got Matt and I to go with him (remember it was only about 15 above, the wind was blowing and it was snowing and it was pitch dark!!!!) and we looked into every hole under the house and finally when into the cellar of the house looking for her and found her still in a tight space under the house (now that is a spooky place with only flashlights for light! I kept thinking about how big rats can get!!). We finally opened up an outside hole under the house on the north side so that she could get out, but by that time, she was so frightened by our noises, that she wouldn't come willingly. She would let Jerry pet her through the opening, but no more than that.

I have many childhood memories probably too numerous to count. Growing up in a family of 7 girls and 3 boys can be very interesting. Especially when your child number 8 and the 6th daughter. Also I enjoyed the story of the kids putting Vaseline down on the coffee table or floor so they could ice-skate. They were imaginative children.

Pat is my marshmallow sister. She has a very kind heart. Probably to kind for her own good. She was great for coming home from college or for a visit with goodies for us

kids. Some of the best goodies were the prizes from the cereal boxes. We thought she was cool. She then left with her bags full of canned food. I also use to have to sleep with Pat and Rosanne. That was no picnic either having 3 in one bed. I was not allowed to cross a section in the bed. In their defense I must admit I was a bed wetter so I guess that was self defense on their part. They use to get on each others nerves and make sounds at each other. Pat did a ribbet frog sound and Rosanne did this horrible dying cow sound from the back of her throat. Quite fun to watch.

What I remember most of Rosanne was her dating Gary her 1st husband. Dad had fun with him. Gary was too much of a "yes, Mr. Schritz" man for Dad not to have a field day with him. I must admit I do remember the love notes I would send Gary. He would come over and I would give him love notes and think it was cute. But as I recall these were supposed to be loving letters from Rosanne not me!

Jerry was never around much. He was either helping Dad with the farm or dating. Yes Jerry, even when he was supposed to be baby sitting, he was dating! He would threaten our lives if we told Mom and Dad he left us alone. Jerry was also the great white hunter of crows on the farm until his wife Sue came along. Jerry was out hunting crows one day using a recording of crow calls to call them in. Our job was to turn the record over when it was finished. Well, with Sue as our cover, we turned the record over. Unfortunately it was not the crow recording rather a Tarzan yell at top volume!! Never seen so many crows go flying in all my life!! Then came Jerry in stomping mad, only he couldn't get too mad because Sue was in on the joke. My final memory of Jerry was how he would have us pop zits on his back. Mom would get furious with us. Oh well, the secret is out.

Brenda had to babysit us a lot. Only she would kick us outside and tell us not to come back in till Mom and Dad were home. Again she had a good reason. She cleaned the house and wanted it kept clean til Mom and Dad came home. Later, when she moved out, she became cool to us younger kids. She took the youngest 4 of us Mary, Me, Stacie, and Jeff on a camping trip to Itasca State Park. Did she have guts or what? We all went in her tiny little green Vega and had a blast!!!! She also brought us to Aqua Park. Aqua Park had an aquarium with big fish to feed. It also had a big stuffed bear out front. Best of all was the deer we could hand feed. Jeff kept the feed in his pocket and the deer who were not shy they would try to take it out of his pocket and just shake the little guy. He had to be maybe 3 or 5 at the time. He was small for his age and so cute. I still love Aqua Park to this day. Great memories for me!!!!

Mary Sue was my playmate in my early years. She was my sister who is 4 years older than I. I remember playing cowboy and Indians with her. However, our version was just Indians. I was known as Wanita and she was White Cloud. As we grew older, we realized Mary Sue's name of White Cloud sounded like an Indian name but was indeed the name of a brand of toilet paper. Maybe that is why we quit playing Indians. Later, Mary Sue taught me how to gopher hunt. I don't think it was truly generosity on her part but rather she needed someone to help pull the wagon, dig holes, and hit the gophers over the head. Well it all turned out. She did split the profits with me. I think we got 10 cents for a stripy tail and 25 cents for pocket gopher feet per pair. Yes someone had to actually count the feet and tails that were collected and turn them into a county extension

man for cash. Sounds gross now, but it was cool at the time. I wonder if they still pay for people to catch gophers in Minnesota. I may find a new career!!

Stacie Schritz Kyhn was my only younger sister. She can come off tough at times but she is really soft on the inside. Stacie just doesn't want to let anyone know. Stacie was born late to be a flower child of the 60s but she hung on somehow. She is into organic, natural, wine making, fairies, etc. My favorite memory of Stacie is when we got her busted. What that means we showed her up. Stacie started breaking out in hives around 8-10 years of age around Easter time. Mom first thought it might be from the dyes in the candy. Later she started breaking out when she did dishes. So naturally Mom couldn't let Stacie do the dishes. This went on for some time. Of course, we loved Stacie, but well there were a lot of dishes to be done and she could do her share. Nothing doing for Mom, she just wasn't having Stacie breakout with hives. Well, Mary Sue and I (Wendy) took Stacie out in the sail boat in the middle of the lake and pinched her but until she got mad and broke out in hives. From that day on, Stacie had to do her share of the dishes because the dishes did not make her break out, it was getting mad. Sorry Stacie, but we just had to blow your cover. After Mary Sue left home, Stacie and I became playmates at home. Like all brother and sisters we tended to argue at times. Once we were at Lake Lizzie and Stacie and I got into an argument about something, but I am not sure what it was about. Anyway one thing lead to another and I was chasing Stacie through the trailer and she fell and hit her head on the vacuum cleaner. Mom was out fishing at the time and when she came in and saw that Stacie was hurt, I knew I was a dead duck. Stacie was so shook up she forgot to tattle on me. She was just afraid Mom was going to find out that we were running or fighting and didn't want to get in trouble. If I never thanked you before Stacie, I am now.

Jeff had to take a lot off of Stacie and me. But in all fairness, he was slightly petted. He never did dishes or house work. After all he was a BOY! He loved to pull pranks and still does. He once put a microphone in the mail box to scare the mail lady who is now our Step Mother Jan. He would also rig up his room to turn the lights and music of when someone opened the door. I think it fried Mom's brain for a while but like always, I'm sure she caught on eventually. Once when Jeff was really young and couldn't swim, he walked of the end of the dock and into the water and just sat there. Mom was scared to death! Mom couldn't swim so she screamed for one of us to jump in and get him. Meanwhile we looked at the end of dock down at Jeff with his cheeks puffed out from holding his breath and his eyes getting bigger and bigger. I think we even tried to tell him to stand up! By this time, Mom was frantic so we jumped in and picked up Jeff. All that panic and the water only came to Jeff's waist. Mom could have just died when she found out the water was only slightly over the waist deep. Us kids could only laugh because all Jeff had to do was stand up. The cutest thing about Jeff was how he turned beet red in the face when he got mad. He was short for his age in school and the kids on the bus loved to pick on him. Ancestors of Ages

Since about 5/8 of my background is Pennsylvania Dutch, I would like to explain about
