Forty-six cuddle quilts have been distributed to St. Joseph's Villa; Our Children, Our Future; Neonatal (including 2 memory quilts and 5 knit hats); Children's Aid; Genevra House; Elizabeth Centre; and the Garson Food Bank.

Beginners, intermediate and advanced quilters, mark our second Cuddle Quilt Day **Saturday**, **November 24th** on your calendar. Please feel free to attend any time between 9am and 3pm at the Guild Room. Marlene Sitka's donated items contained many panels. Dainty Citron has graciously volunteered to demonstrate how to add to these panels to make quilts of all sizes. If you need further enticement, Nicolle has volunteered to bring homemade soup, all you require is a bowl and a spoon!

Wheelchair Quilts

If you are interested in making quilts for persons who require the use of a wheelchair, the following information, provided by Carmen Huggins, is extremely useful.

- Length of quilt should be the measurement from the waist to the feet, which is ~40".
 Remember, for a man, this measurement will be a little bit longer.
- Width of quilt should be the sitting measurement (across your front, from seat to seat, plus a few more inches, but not so much that the quilt will get caught in the wheels of the chair).
- If you are making a quilt for someone who is totally dependent on a wheelchair, extend your quilt length so that it can be folded under ~6" to 8" and tacked to the side of the quilt. This will keep feet nice and warm. For those who have had a stroke, the quilt can be reversed so the hands can be kept warm.
- Carmen suggests sewing a shirt/jean pocket to the front of the quilt. This makes a place for the storage of keys/personal items.
- Quilts should be made of cotton fronts and flannel/flannelette backing. This prevents the quilt from slipping.
- Please do not attach ties. Carmen indicated that she would place this herself.

For the Cuddle Quilt Committee members – Janet, Agnes, Mariette and Colombe

Neonatal Knit Hat Pattern

Needles: set of 4 -- 3.75mm or 4.00mm double ended needles

Circumference of the hat should be between 5.5" (14cm) and 11" (28cm). If using fine yarns knit using two strands of yarn.

Cast on 40 (48, 56, 64) sts. Distribute over 3 needles. When I took the hats to Neonatal they were thrilled to receive the medium to larger sized hats.

Work 8 rounds in P1, K1

Work 18 (20, 22, 24) rounds in stocking stitch (knit every round).

Start at 7th (5th, 3rd, 1st) round.

1st round: (K6, K2 tog) repeat to end (56 sts)

2nd, 4th, 6th, 8th, 10th rounds: K

3rd round: (K5, K2 tog) repeat to end (48 sts)

5th round: (K4, K2 tog) repeat to end (40 sts)

7th round: (K3, K2 tog) repeat to end (32 sts)

Continue decreasing until ~ 6 stitches remain.

Thread end of yarn through needle. Pull thread through stitches. Secure end.



PLUM TORTE

Preheat oven to 350F(180C) 9" springform pan, buttered and floured Cream together: 1 cup(250mL) sugar 1/2 cup(125mL) butter Add and beat until fine crumbs: 1 cup(250mL) flour 1 tsp(5mL) baking powder Add and beat: 2 eggs, lightly beaten. Spoon into pan, spreading evenly. 16-24 prune plums halved. Place cut side down on batter. Combine: 3 Tbsp(45mL) sugar 1 1/2 tsp(7mL) cinnamon. Sprinkle over plums. Bake for 1 hour. Serves 8-10 Freezes beautifully. Will last up to nine months if well wrapped. This was received in an email...
