## Membership



'Tis hard to believe that spring is finally imminent, just as it is hard to believe that we are only a few short weeks away from our Guild Year end. I am still

open to questions by anyone interested in volunteering for Membership Chair next year. Please do not hesitate to approach me at any meeting or call me at home. It really is the kind of job that allows you to get to know your fellow Guild sisters.

And speaking of getting to know your Guild sisters.... it has been brought to my attention by some of our new members that NAME TAGS would be very helpful at our meetings and events. I myself have been guilty of not wearing mine a few times but as a rule I try to make sure to don it. Pin it to your Guild bag and you are more likely to have it with you. We cannot make the assumption that just because we have belonged for many years that we are known to all. **Please facilitate conversation, sharing, and friendships by wearing your name tag.** If you have not as yet purchased one I would love to take your order. Cost is currently \$9.50. If you do not wish to order a Guild tag, then I encourage you to wear some other form of identification such as your membership card in a badge holder, an office name tag, or a sticky "HELLO my name is" label. Thanks for helping make our Guild a welcoming place to attend.

Finally, I am proposing an amendment to our constitution relating to Membership dues for **new** members joining late in the Guild Year. Here is an outline of the proposed changes for you to consider and discuss ahead of the Annual Meeting on April 21<sup>st</sup> at which time we can vote to accept or not.

### Current Article:

**Article 3:** Membership in the Guild is open, on payment of the prescribed annual fee, to any person with an interest in either quilting or stitchery and who supports the objectives of the Guild. All new members joining the Guild shall pay only the pre-November annual fee regardless of when in the year they join,

### Proposed Amendment:

**Article 3:** Membership in the Guild is open, on payment of the prescribed annual fee, to any person with an interest in either quilting or stitchery and who supports the objectives of the Guild.

Fees for new members will be the pre-November annual fee until January 1<sup>st</sup> of the Guild Year. New members joining after that date will pay \$1 per remaining week of the Guild Year.

**Rationale:** New members, regardless of when they join are required to pay the \$30 (current annual fee). The rationale for not prorating the fee was linked to *Quilts on the Rocks* where there is a requirement to be a member in the year prior and year of the exhibition. This discouraged the practice of "new members" who would join the Guild in **only** those two years in order to be allowed to exhibit. If reduced fees were allowed, it was pre-supposed that they might just join late in the year preceding QOR in order to qualify.

With this motion I am suggesting that we not discourage and penalize potential new members who come to join us in the second half of a Guild Year. Our year usually runs about 30 weeks in the period from September to May. With our current \$30 fee this works out to about \$1 per week. Thus I am proposing that new members who wish to join after January 1<sup>st</sup> be charged \$1 per remaining week in the Guild Year. Because they are not paying a full annual fee of \$30 they would be precluded from exhibiting in a QOR show if it were to occur in the year following their enrolment. This is spelled out in a proposed new Article 8(b) below.

### **Article 8(b)**

In order for members to exhibit at Quilts on the Rocks they must have paid the **full** annual fee in the year prior and the year of the exhibition.

We would like a wide variety of techniques to present to the community and hope that all of our members have at least one project to enter into the show. Over the past 3 years the guild has held many evening workshops, weekend classes and year end projects that we hope to include. Remember this is a showcase of the work of the members, not a competition. All work is valued and we look forward to including everything in the show. If you are new to quilting please indicate this on your form in the section provided.

## CUDDLE QUILT REPORT

The three years that I have been involved with the Cuddle Quilt Programme have passed very quickly. Over this period of time, the Cuddle Quilt Programme has distributed 702 cuddle quilts to 17 community organizations (end of March, 2009).

Highlights of our programme:-

- 26 twin sized/cuddle quilts were given to the fire victims of Pioneer Manor
- 20 twin bed quilts, 9 cuddle quilts, 136 mini memory quilts and 36 placemats were donated to our new Maison Vale Inco Hospice. The Guild is a recognized partner of the Hospice, and we have an ongoing partnership. Our quilts make the Hospice very homey and a place for the living, and our mini memory quilts give comfort to the families and show others in the community care.
- 5 full size quilts were given to fire victims, a single Mom and her four children, to help them rebuild their lives.

I have been honoured to have had the opportunity to meet and get to know the many caring and compassionate ladies of our guild who have contributed to the success of our programme. An added benefit has been the interaction with community organizations, and an understanding of the importance of cuddle quilts to their clients. Success is also based on the wonderful ladies of the committee who each have worked very hard, and brought their individual knowledge and skills to the committee. For their commitment I am extremely grateful and offer my profound thank you.

To the new guild members who would like to lead and work on the Cuddle Quilt Committee for the coming

year(s), this is an outline of the responsibilities of the Committee.

### **CUDDLE QUILT COMMITTEE RESPONSIBILITIES**

The objective of the Cuddle Quilt Committee is to accept donated quilts from the membership and distribute them to needful groups, organizations, or individuals in the Sudbury community.

To achieve this goal, The Committee:

- Provides when possible material, batting and backing for the construction of cuddle quilts
- Collects finished quilts, placemats and mini memory quilts
- Displays finished quilts at guild meeting, crediting the maker(s)
- Accepts the donation of quilt tops, orphan blocks, squares, strips, fabric, thread...
- Finishes or finds members to finish donated items into quilts
- Offers unsuitable donated fabric or other items to guild members
- Distributes quilts to organizations, groups or individuals in our community
- Purchases batting for our projects (Walmart has the most efficient usage of batting)
- Makes kits, with instructions, available for guild members to use
- Makes labels to be attached to all items donated from the guild
- Attaches labels to those items not having a label
- Keeps the boxes in the cupboard well organized.
- Organizes five Cuddle Quilt Saturdays, 9-3pm, during the guild year during which a new quilt block pattern is made available, for those who attend, to work on
  - Cuddle quilt Saturdays require a program plan for the block, sign up lists provided at the weekly meetings for members, refreshments, booking of the room with the YMCA, setup of tables, clean-up after
- The year prior to and the year of Quilt on the Rocks, the committee is responsible for a display and working area at Quilt on the Rocks. One member is a representative on the Quilt on the Rocks Committee.

### **The Committee Chair:**

- Gives a presentation at each guild meeting
- Writes a Cuddle Quilt Report each month for the Newsletter
- Presents a written report at the two yearly guild business meetings
- Keeps a running up to date financial statement. At present, cuddle quilt funds are separate from guild funding as the money is donated from Quilt on the Rocks funds.
- Liaises with community organizations, groups or individuals
- Records members contributions throughout the guild year, in green binder
- Records number of quilts donated to the organizations, groups or individuals in our community
- Writes thank you notes when required

All of the ladies on the present committee are dedicated cuddle quilt participants and will still be active in making cuddle quilts in the future. We will be able to assist in the transition. The present Committee members will be active in showcasing the Cuddle Quilt community aspect of our guild at the upcoming Quilt on the Rocks. It will be nice to have the two committees working together.

Speaking of Quilt on the Rocks, do you have an item you can donate to the silent auction? All proceeds from this auction will go toward the Cuddle Quilt Programme over a three year period. Because of the generous donation of funds by Quilt on the Rocks to the Cuddle Quilt Committee, no guild funds have been accessed for our Programme over the past 3 years. This allows us to be independent of guild funds.

Our last Cuddle Quilt Saturday was held on March 28<sup>th</sup>. Again, other quilting events conflicted with "our day". Twenty members and family were present. We had a quiet day, save for the drums and chair cleaning, working on the pattern of the day shown to us by Patti MacKinnon, and completing other cuddle quilt projects.

Since our last Newsletter, we have received quilts, mini memory quilts, placemats, quilting services, material, thread, kits, cross stitching and neonatal bonnets, booties and dress from Janet Wiebe, Lynn Binney, Colombe Charest, Mary Ellen Langlois, Susan Hajek, Nancy Burdeniuk, Val MacKelvie, Dorothy

McPhail, Mariette Brunette, Pat Jacobson, Sharon Bourque, Rita Dickie, Nancy McCrae, Florence Ziminski, Nicole Rautiainan, Juliet McDonald, Susan Cardinal, Dorothy Dopson, Huguette LaRose, Ladies of Marguerite D'Youville Church, Suzanne Burke, Helene Ranger-Vaillancourt, Anita Flesher, Lou Pegoraro, Janet Burns, Ann Scott, Cathy Grist and Doris McLaren. From Sharon Bourque: I stumbled on this website through a blog that I visit and thought it would be a good one to put in the Newsletter.

It has a ton of free patterns for scrap quilts and some good tutorials.

There is a link on the one side for english paper piecing patterns, and most of them can be done with Inklingo, and there are also other interesting links to videos etc...

Inklingo is the program that I use to print the cutting and stitching lines onto fabric with my inkjet printer. I have used it for the last couple of hand piecing classes that I have done. Right now I have two Inklingo projects on the go. One is pinwheels done with half hexagons that have 3/4 inch seams, that I have had at guild quite a few times. They all interlock to form a tessellating pinwheel design.

The second project I just started recently, and it is a Grandmothers Flower Garden. I have always loved the design but wasn't about to do it with English Paper Piecing. To add a bit of a challenge to mine, I am using hexagons that have 1/4 inch seam lines. Although the original design should make a queen sized quilt, mine will finish at 27 1/2 inches wide by 37 1/2 inches long. It is actually going together faster than I thought it might, but I found out the other night that it will be stitched as I go, not make the flowers and try to assemble the tiny units!

Also along the Inklingo line, I found this interesting newsletter The March issue of Cotton Spice has an Apple Core project in there for the Inklingo Apple Core shape collection! Quilter Linda tested the pattern and her project picture is in there too. It's a table runner ready for spring! :) <http://www.cottonspice.com/>

## Clover Chacoliner Caution

Got this email on one of the lists I belong to and wanted to share it with everyone:

→ I've been quilting shamrocks marked with light blue Clover Chacoliner. The blister packaging gives help to keep the markings from brushing off before you're finished quilting but not how to get it off when you're done. Brushing and cold water wasn't working so Nancy

at City Quilter suggested emailing Clover and here was their reply. It's working but only with repeated application.

"The best solution is to wash the quilt in 5 parts water, 2 parts vinegar. That always does the trick. Also, never put the quilt in the dryer before the chalk is removed, the heat will set it. For future use, always wash and dry your cloth before you use the chalk. Have a great day and thank you for choosing Clover products. "

## Pin Sharpening Pincushion

First, make a 3" block. It can be paper\_pieced or whatever you want. You can make one for the front and one for the back if you want. Then, take a square Brillo pad (use the ones with soap) and wrap with a layer or two of batting. Sew up three sides of the blocks and stuff the Brillo pad inside (you may need to bend it a bit). Sew up the fourth side and viola! It keeps your pins sharp, rust free and slippery
