At each Quilts on the Rocks show we present an award named the "Vena Mietins Award for Original Stitchery". This award was started over 30 years ago by one of our Life Members \_ Vena Mietins. Vena has donated the prize of \$250 for the best original stitchery displayed at each Quilts on the Rocks Show.

Vena's passion is, to this day, 'creative original stitchery'..... "come up with an idea, put it into a plan, make the pattern and stitch it". It is Vena's mission in life to inspire and encourage others to take on the challenge of doing original work.

Since we would like to see more original Stitchery entries at the upcoming 2009 Quilts on the Rocks Show, Vena has enthusiastically issued a challenge to all Guild Members: "Vena's Challenge" which is entitled "Stitch a True Life Story". According to Vena, any event in your life can be stitched. It could be the birth of a baby or the death of a loved one or it could be \_ a first love or a lost love. It could be arriving at your camp for the first time of the season or a memorable sunset. We are looking for as many entries as possible which must be completed by the Guild Banquet in May. Some of the newer members may be unfamiliar with the In-Club Quilt. Essentially it is a quilt that is made conjointly by the members of the guild which will be raffled at the year-end banquet in May of 2009. Everyone who contributes their time and talent has a chance to win, whether it is cutting fabric, piecing or hand-quilting.

As my first experience in heading such an undertaking, I chose a beginner pattern so that I can concentrate my efforts in the planning and execution of the project rather than on the quilt itself. The pattern is called "Sunny Lanes" from the book Nickel Quilts – Great Designs from 5-Inch Scraps by authors Pat Speth and Charlene Thode (That Patchwork Place). Fabrics from Thimbleberries – Greetings from Canada were chosen, as I love earthy/country colours and I have a certain pride when it comes to Canada, whether it be music, literature, or fabric! It was also important to me for the quilt to be gender-neutral so that it could be enjoyed just about anywhere at the lucky winner's discretion. I would like to address a few misconceptions I have heard with regard to Cuddle Quilts. First, the quilts we donate to our community organizations are well made quilts using cotton, cotton-polyester, and flannel fabrics. Fabrics donated and unsuitable for quilting are put on the back table for Guild members to take. All our quilts are made with the same standards as quilts that we ourselves would like to receive. Second, we are extremely fortunate that our cupboard, at this moment, has an abundance of material, batting, and backing which we encourage you to use in cuddle quilts. Third, many guild members also use their own materials, batting and backing for our cuddle quilts, and our long arm quilters have been very generous with their donation of quilting services, batting, backing, thread and time. Your cuddle quilts are **very** appreciated by all who receive them.

On Saturday, November 29<sup>th</sup>, we held our second cuddle quilt day of this year. Twenty six participants were busy working on the crazy quilt squares, their own project or finishing up previous cuddle quilt day quilts. Dot's soup, Kathie's rolls and member donations made our lunch very enjoyable.

Mark Saturday, **January 10<sup>th</sup>** on your calendar. This will be our first cuddle quilt day of the New Year. We will be working on block squares. Daintry will be giving a session on how to put a quilt together by quilting smaller sections and joining them to make a full quilt. This is very useful to those who have limited sewing space or a small throat on their machine.

The Guild response to our mini memory quilt plea has been very positive. We have heard from various members and Maison Vale I nco Hospice on how important our mini quilts are to the families of residents who have passed away. Knowing others care, means a lot.
