R. R. Agites To Establish 3 New Trains

Better Service for Wilton Commuters to Start on May 25

At a confurence in New York City yesterday, the New Haven Railroad agreed to put three addi. tional trains for commuters into operation on its Danbury-South Norwalk branch.

News of the successful culmunation of the agitation for better service was given to the Bulletin today by Rep. George VanRiper of Wilton, a member of a special committee appointed to confer with railroad officials at the secand hearing before the Public Utilities Commission in Wilton last week.

Yesterday's conference was in the ratiroad's general offices. John P. O'Connell. 1 member of the aidities commission, presided.

The railross agreed to increase the present morning service into New York by providing a new train, in addition to the present service, which train will leave Danbury at about 7 o'clock with a stop at Wiltor at 7:25. The train will connect with the 7:47 at South Norwalk which arrives in New York at 8:46 a m.
