Right to Buy Sugar Denied to 76 who Had Excess Supply on Hand

Registration for sugar ration books was still going on at the Center School in Wilton and the Gilbert and Bennett School is Georgetown when the Bulletts went to press. Returns for the first three days, Monday, Turnday and Wednesday revealed that 2,56 individuals had applied for books and that 2.567 had been issued The 76 applicants who did not

receive books were those who had a store of sugar on hand which was the equivalent or more than the amount to be nationed over the four rationing periods ending June 27. Books will be issued to them when their excess rupplies have been consumed at ration speed. Many others had stamps removed from their books in proportion to sugar on hand in encru of the two pounds permitted for each person-Stamp Periods

The first four stamps in the brooks issued permit the purchase of one pound of sugar at four

different periods. The first pound is the allotment from May 5 to 16 The second stamp permits the purchase of a pound of user from May 17 to May 30. Stamp number three may be used during the usried of May 31 to June 13, and the fourth stamp from June 14 to June 27. At that time announcements will be made to inform householders in regard to the purchasing power of the next series of stamps There are 26 stamps in rock
