The Rod Serling Memorial Foundation Ithaca College School of Communications WSKG Public Television



The program reviews Serling's meteoric rise as a television writer in the 1950's, and includes scenes from his classic drama Requiem for a Heavyweight (CBS, 1956). Also documented is Serling's quintessential Twilight Zone series (CBS, 1959-1964), and his crucial activities in the development of the television and film industries. Rare interview footage adds a unique perspective to the program. Along with photographs and personal recollections from life-long friends and colleagues, Day of A Playwright provides a warm and candid portrait of one of the great writers of our time. 1985.

TEXTILES: A PRIMER

APPAREL NOTEBOOK: ASSESSING PRODUCT OUALITY

Department of Textiles and Apparel School of Human Ecology Cornell University Ithaca, New York

This series of programs, ranging from 20 minutes to 40 minutes in length, was produced using AT&T Videotex FCS 500 2-D graphic animation equipment. The programs were developed by department faculty for viewing both in the classroom and by individuals in an interactive video setting.

Through use of scripted color animation, numerous processes of textile and apparel production are depicted visually in elemental detail.

The series was partially underwritten by the National Endowment for the Arts. It was written by Susan Watkins and Anita Racine, professors of apparel design. 1986, 1987.

DIGITAL ANIMATION IN 3-D Cornell University Educational Television Center Ithaca, New York

A review of 1988 computer graphics technology, with examples of state-of-the art-techniques in modelling and broadcast animation.

This short (7-minute) video is directed to those who would like to better understand the practical aspects of high-resolution computer graphics. It outlines the various phases of production from concept through storyboard, to wireframe and final sequencing. Numerous examples are used to illustrate production phases and such aesthetics as rendering, light sources, texture-mapping, paintboxes, motion paths and the like.

Though abridged, Digital Animation in 3-D provides concise, current information on the use of computers as tools for highly realistic visualization.

The imagery in this program was created by the producer over the course of intensive equipment evaluations conducted for the Educational Television Center at Cornell University. Creative assistance from Eric Humerez. 1988.

Serling grew up in this small upstate New York community and left his indelible mark there. The display occupies over 150 square feet in the main theater lobby.

The display features over 80 items at one time, taken in rotation from an archive of photographs, documents, letters and personal memorabilia. This archive, curated by the Serling Foundation, contains many hundreds of pieces.

Design and creation of the display required special construction and treatment of the display area, acquisition and preparation of display items, and editorial composition. 1985.


