## SOS Children's Villages Helps Children in Need

As many of you know, SOS Children's Villages, the North American chapter of a worldwide non-governmental organization (NGO), has been the charity of choice for the American-Austrian Society for many years now. Thanks to the generosity of you, our members, our Society has over time contributed financially to the efforts of this worthwhile organization.

After a recent meeting with Dr. Heather Paul, the organization's CEO, and Kristin Backstrom, the Director of Donor Relations, we thought you might be interested in learning a little bit about the organization's mission.

SOS Children's Villages was founded in 1949 in Austria, in the wake of the terrible devastation left behind by World War II, to provide families and homes for orphaned or abandoned children.

Its visionary founder, Hermann Gmeiner, who gave up his medical studies at the University of Innsbruck to pursue his dream, was subsequently awarded the Nobel Peace Prize.

Today, there are more than 450 villages in 132 countries around the world.

## Introducing the Members of Our Executive Board: Prof. Dr. Peter Y. Evans



Dr. Evans was born in 1925 in Tokyo; father Japanese, mother German-English. Childhood in Jena and Berlin, Germany. Since 1938 in Austria. In 1944, after matura in Ptui (Pettau), he began medical school in

Vienna. 1951 MD, Univ. of Innsbruck. Residency in ophthalmology 1951-55 in Innsbruck and Frankfurt/Main. In 1957, he emigrated to the USA. Since 1958 at Georgetown University; Department of Ophthalmology (Center for Sight); Chairman 1969-83. Holds the German, American and Austrian Boards of Ophthalmology. In 1963 established the first two-year ophthalmic technology training program in the USA, and in 1969 co-founded the North-American Commission for examination and certification (JCAHPO) of this new profession, now numbering about 17,000 internationally and representing a vital link in the prevention of blindness. After retiring from full-time academia in 1992, he continued as fulltime EVP of JCAHPO for another four years.

Prof. Evans was President of our Society from 1988-90, and agreed to serve as 1st Vice President this year. He and his wife Helga have seven children and (at this point) 16 grandchildren, none of whom speak German very well, but they all understand most of it. His hobbies include the violin, bridge, philately, photography, skiing, and travel.

## Austrian Embassy Concert on March 5, 2007 Featured Tibor Kovac and Lambert Orkis

After an intense set of Vienna Philharmonic concerts in New York, violinist Tibor Kovac gave a stunning recital together with pianist Lambert Orkis at the Austrian Embassy in Washington. A longtime member of the Philharmonic, Kovac has also won

renown as a soloist in Vienna's magnificent Musikverein and as a violinist in the famed chamber ensemble, *Die Wiener Virtuosen*. Orkis is a highly recognized pianist, fortepianist and harpsichordist as a soloist, accompanist, chamber music player and member of Washington's National Symphony Orchestra.

Kovac's and Orkis's intriguing, though demanding, program at the Austrian Embassy in early March ranged from Mozart's Sonata in B-flat Major, K. 454, and that in E-flat Major, K. 481, to Beethoven's Sonata in D Major, Op. 12, No. 1, and

Orkis worked with Kovac in a perfect partnership, following Kovac's phrasing and refined nuances, finely adjusting their style for quite different composers. At one point in the second Mozart, Kovac's E-string suddenly snapped, requiring him to shift his fingering and adjust his touch on the remaining three strings in order to complete the final movement. He ended triumphantly. Generous applause won the audience an encore, Fritz Kreisler's memorable "Liebesleid," which Kovac and Orkis played with warmth, intensity and sophistication.

Approximately 60,000 children are in the villages, and there are about 600.000 beneficiaries from SOS community-outreach programs.

The mission of the SOS Children's Villages is based on the principle that each child should have the right to grow up in a safe and loving environment to reach healthy adulthood. Some of the basic ideas include:

- THE MOTHER: Each child has a caring parent
- **BROTHERS AND SISTERS: Siblings** always stay together, and family ties are built
- THE HOUSE: Each family creates their own home.
- THE VILLAGE: The SOS family is part of the community.

A village typically consists of about 10 - 15 family homes in an integrated setting and raises approximately 150 childrenuntil adulthood. Additionally, these villages serve as anchors for community services for thousands more children and families through education and training, prevention

programs and disaster relief. SOS mothers are rigorously trained and screening before they take on their responsibilities.

Additionally, the villages often provide basic medical services to the community, in addition to counseling support and emergency nutrition to families at risk.



One of the core values of the organization is to promote understanding of all races, religions and cultural diversity and to transcend political and sectarian strife.

Typically, SOS children are abandoned infants, destitute street children, child soldiers or orphans due to HIV/ AIDS and sibling groups too burdensome for extended family care.

Oftentimes, SOS villages are established in the wake of natural or man-made disasters: 7 new villages were built in South East Asia after the tsunami of 2005. The most recent addition is a village in Lebanon.

The offices of SOS Children's Villages USA are located in downtown Washington DC. Its CEO and staff work actively with the various American-Austrian societies and organizations across the United States. Major part of the organization's



income stems from private donations (about 90%), whereas the remaining 10% are contributed by corporate sponsors.

The Executive Board of the American-Austrian Society of Washington DC intends to intensify its contact with SOS Children's Villages USA to explore possibilities for deepening and strengthening our support.
