Ethanol damage to engines confirmed

The Federal Government will push for mandatory labelling of petrol mixed with ethanol after studies released yesterday found the additive could damage vital engine parts.

The studies, on an outboard motor and a garden trimmer, found 10 per cent ethanol content was relatively safe, but 20 per cent caused major problems.

Federal Environment Minister David Kemp said there was still no proof that the additive — derived from grain crops or sugar cane — caused damage to car engines. But he hoped the states would force fuel outlet's to carry ethanol labelling within two months.

A recent Environment Australia study of 615 fuel samples found 9 per cent contained ethanol. Seven samples had more than 20 per cent ethanol, and another 38 had between 10 and 20 per cent.

The study of ethanol's impact on engines found the 10 per cent blend caused no substantial changes, except slight swelling and blistering on the carburettor and an increase in carbon deposits on pistons.

But when the fuel contained 20 per cent ethanol, substantial problems were encountered. The outboard engine stalled on occasions, exhaust gas temperature increased by a significant margin and in some cases there was extensive corrosion of engine parts.

Dr Kemp said the studies increased pressure on the states and territories to require labelling of fuel that has been mixed with ethanol.

The studies came after BP dumped a trial of a 10 per cent ethanol blend in six Brisbane service stations. The company said demand from motorists collapsed after controversy grew over the additive.

Towing trailers



With school holidays just round the corner its good to be aware of our trailer use responsibilities on the road.

THE LAWS (a brief summary)

- All trailers must be in roadworthy condition. Basically this means all lights working, good tyres, structurally sound and good coupling and safety chain.
- The total mass (weight) of the trailer and its load should not be more than the mass of the towing vehicle.
- Nobody is allowed to ride in a trailer.
- Small trailers, which are not boat trailers and weigh less than 200kg unloaded, are less than 3.m overall lengths and are narrower than the towing vehicle, **do not** have to be registered.
- All trailers must have a number plate. Either that of the towing vehicle or the registered trailer number plate.
- 'P'Plate drivers are permitted to tow a trailer, but 'L' Plate drivers are not.

THE VEHICLE

- Vehicles need to be sufficiently powerful and heavy enough for the load.
- Vehicle manufacturers usually state the maximum capacity a car may tow.
- A properly designed and fitted towbar should be marked with their load capacity and the vehicle model they are designed for.
- Towbars must not protrude dangerously or obscure the rear number plate.
- Allow for greater fuel consumption and extra strain on brakes, cooling system, transmission and suspension.

THE DRIVER

- Drivers need to understand the general principals of driving with a trailer before attempting to tow in traffic or at highway speeds.
- Greater stopping distances must be allowed. Acceleration will be much slower. Keep left whenever possible.
- Allowance must be made for the extra length and width of trailers and their tendency to "cut in" on corners and curves.
- Reversing with a large trailer or caravan takes practice. It is a good idea to have an observer watching the rear.
- Brakes should be applied early and smoothly especially in the wet or when cornering.
- If a trailer starts to sway (snaking) the tow vehicles brakes **should not** be applied, except as an absolute last resort. If the trailers brakes can be operated by themselves they should be applied gently, otherwise a steady speed or slight acceleration should be held if possible until the sway stops.

LOADING TRAILERS

- For safety reasons it is important that trailers are not overloaded in any respect, ie. Have a greater total mass than the ATM (Aggregate Trailer Mass) recommended by the manufacturer, or exceed tyre or tow coupling capacity.
- Loads should be kept as low as possible and positioned as close to the axle as possible with about 60% of the total mass forward of the centre of the axle.
- All loads must be properly secured to trailers.
- Have trailer wheel bearings checked before a trip. Avoid recapped tyres.
